Fry wins the Men's Golf Big South Championship

USC Upstate senior golfer Hunter Fry (Dacula, Ga.) won the Big South Championship on April 20th at The Patriot at Grand Harbor Country Club.

Fry becomes the first male golfer in the Division I era to win a Conference Championship and he is the first Upstate golfer since Baxter Culler won the Peach Belt Championship in 2007. With the win Fry automatically qualifies for the NCAA Tournament and becomes the first player since Jordan Warnock to advance to the regional stage. This is also the first time in program history that USC Upstate holds the individual championships for both the men's and women's tournaments at the same time.

Dailey earns President's List honor for Fall 2020

SMC expands opportunities to earn online degrees

Spartanburg Methodist College expands education with online degree opportunities

Spartanburg Methodist College (SMC) is opening up new opportunities for students to earn an associate or bachelor's degree with a portfolio of nine online degree programs.

The college will offer three associate and six bachelor's degree programs beginning in the fall of 2021.

"In today's world, higher education has had to adapt to a new atmosphere, including the need to provide degree programs in non-traditional formats," said Dr. Toni Bennett, associate provost for online strategy at SMC. "Bringing SMC into the digital world with these online degree programs will allow us to reach a wider audience, providing opportunity for more students to advance their career options."

SMC's online degree programs will feature the same in-depth education and personal approach the

college provides in the classroom. The new programs provide an opportunity for non-traditional students whose work, family, or other commitments prevent them from attending school in person.

Students can choose to get their two-year Associate in Arts, Associate in Criminal Justice, or Associate in Business from the same faculty and curriculum as the college's traditional on-campus programs. The associate degrees provide students a pathway into a bachelor's degree program or an opportunity to move directly into an entry-level position in their chosen career field.

The online bachelor's degree programs provide students a four-year degree in either criminal justice, with a concentration in business or psychology, or business administration, choosing a focus in accounting and finance,

economics and finance, management and entrepreneurship, or marketing and sales.

SMC's online bachelor's degrees will also include the school's unique Camak Core classes. These professional development courses focus on providing students an advantage when seeking a career by teaching them key soft skills employers are looking for, including leadership, professional communications, and technology. Students will also gain real-world experience through internship opportunities.

"The new online degree programs are a great step for SMC and keep with our mission of providing a quality education for everyone," said SMC President Scott Cochran.

SMC will offer five, eight-week terms per year, allowing online students to study at their own pace and on their own schedule.

VCOM medical school receives \$125,000 Hearst Foundation grant

The William Randolph Hearst Foundation has awarded \$125,000 to the Edward Via College of Osteopathic Medicine (VCOM) to fund scholarships for 50 VCOM medical students pursuing careers in primary care medicine.

In receiving news of the grant, VCOM President and Provost Dixie Tooke-Rawlins said, "We appreciate so much the commitment of The Hearst Foundations. As a medical school committed to educating physicians to serve rural and medically underserved populations, and a focus on the southern Appalachian and Delta regions of the southeastern United States, our mission aligns well with the commitment of the Hearst Foundations."

Paul "Dino" Dinovitz, Hearst Foundations' Executive Director, added, "The VCOM Scholarship

Program embodies our dual commitment to helping leading academic institutions respond to the country's evolving health-care needs and to supporting medical students who are pursuing their dreams to become primary care physicians and returning to practice in underserved communities."

President Tooke-Rawlins also added, "From its earliest beginning, VCOM has recruited students from, provided training in and returned qualified graduates to the southeastern United States. More than 47% of our students are from rural communities of less than 30,000, with 23% coming from communities of less than 10,000. These scholarships from the Hearst Foundations will assist our students who have a commitment to returning to these regions to serve."

Last year, with the open-

ing of a fourth campus at the University of Louisiana Monroe, VCOM became the largest provider of physicians in the southeastern United States and the second largest in the country, enrolling 650 new students each year. The four VCOM campuses are located in the southeast United States where the largest physician shortages exist and life expectancy is often up to 10 years shorter than the rest of the nation. The campuses located in southwest Virginia, Alabama, and South Carolina will graduate 476 new physicians in 2021 and raise the total number of VCOM physician graduates to more than 4,100.

Keep it simple in the kitchen on Mother's Day

Beginner's Pasta with Spinich

- 8 ounces angel hair pasta
- 1 gallon cold water
- 4 teaspoons salt (for water)
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 can (14.5-ounce) diced tomatoes
- 1 tablespoon Italian seasoning spice
- 1 package (10-ounce) pre-washed baby spinach
- 1/2 cup sour cream or feta cheese
- 2 tablespoons prepared basil pesto

TO COOK THE PASTA:

1. Fill a large, tall stockpot with the water, turn heat to high and bring water to a boil.
2. When water begins to boil, add the salt. (Adding the salt to the water now is necessary because it's the time when the pasta absorbs it best. Do not add oil of any kind. Oil will coat the pasta, and the sauce will not stick.)
3. Hold the pasta vertically over the boiling water and carefully slide it into the pot. Lower the heat to medium so the pasta water doesn't foam up and boil over the sides. Slowly submerge the pasta.
4. Turn the heat back up to high. Stir the pasta to keep it from clumping together. Stir every few minutes as needed to keep the pasta separated.
5. After 6 to 8 minutes, use the fork or spoon to pull out a piece of pasta. Taste it to see if it is soft, not raw or starchy-tasting. The pasta is done when it is "al dente," which is Italian for "when it is right for the tooth," and refers to the correct cooking point of pasta. If the pasta isn't done, let it continue to cook another 2 or 3 minutes until it's soft but firm – not mushy or overcooked.
6. Fill a coffee cup with some of the pasta water and set it aside to use when making the sauce.
7. Place a large colander in the sink. Carefully drain the pasta into the colander.
8. Pick up the colander with the potholders and shake it well to remove any excess water from the pasta. Do NOT rinse the pasta.
9. Place the drained pasta back into the large pot and start making the sauce.

TO MAKE THE SAUCE:

1. Using a large saucepan, over medium-high heat, melt the butter and add the olive oil. Add the tomatoes, Italian seasoning and spinach, a few handfuls at a time, and stir to combine.
2. When the spinach begins to wilt, stir in the sour cream or feta cheese and the pesto.
3. Pour the sauce into the large pot containing the drained pasta. Turn the heat to low.
4. Mix the sauce and the pasta together until well-combined.
5. Use a 1 or 2 tablespoons of the pasta water to thin out the sauce, as needed.
6. Place the finished pasta in a large bowl and serve immediately with garlic bread or rolls. Serves 6.

Ribbon cutting officially opens Kids Planet playground

Many children consider television and video games their recreation. Greer wanted to encourage its citizens to "Get Outside and Play!" The result was a play area that has served as the model for preteen recreational areas across the Upstate.

Ann Cunningham, director of the City's Parks and Recreation Department, emceed the ceremony held at the new Benson Automotive Kids Planet playground's entrance.

"The result of a long and intentional planning process is what we have today: an enchanted forest themed playground venue

with many diverse play structures, built for everyone, of all ages and abilities," Cunningham said. "Benson Automotive Kids Planet is unique and has a very innovative design. It is truly a destination, attracting families and visitors from all over."

The playground was built on the site of the original Kids Planet, which became a fixture for upstate children when it opened in 1999. As those wooded play structures began to age, the City of Greer developed a master plan in 2017 for a complete rebuild of the facility. That process included a community workshop for

parents and visits to six local elementary schools to collect ideas for themes and play structures.

The original playground closed in September of

2019 and work began on the new facility with its enchanted forest theme. The new Benson Automotive Kids Planet includes requested features

of the new playground such as: 2 fence-enclosed misting play area, musical activity space, ziplines, hillside slides, ground level trampoline, special needs child/parent swing, a walking trail with exercise stations, misters, themed play structures and much MORE!

Sno-Hut is located just outside the main entrance offering concessions for children and parents alike.

The Parks History

In 1998, a planning team of 25 community volunteers worked under the leadership of the architectural firm of Leathers and Associates of Ithaca, New

York, to design and plan a unique playground. It took one year of raising funds, tweaking designs, amassing volunteers, buying lumber, and securing tools to literally build the structure from the ground up. It was a moving sight when more than 3,000 volunteers from all walks of life came to build the playground in nine days in March of 1999.

The playground, located at 3605 Brushy Creek Rd., is open daily from dawn until dusk with the exception of Wednesdays when staff performs maintenance from 7 a.m. until noon.

Joseph Vaughn statue, a permanent monument to a legacy of change, unveiled at Furman

Joseph Allen Vaughn '68 wanted to be just another student. But that was never going to happen.

A popular figure on campus, the Greenville native stood out as a member of the Baptist Student Union, ROTC, the Collegiate Educational Service Corps, the Southern Student Organizing Committee and the cheerleading squad. He excelled academically and graduated cum laude with degrees in French and English.

He was also, when he enrolled in January 1965, Furman's first Black student. And now his statue is the first likeness of a person of color represented prominently on campus, the focal point of the new Joseph Vaughn Plaza in front of the James B. Duke Library. The statue depicts Vaughn as he appeared in a photo at that time, as his classmates often saw him: walking down the library steps, books tucked under his arm.

"We very purposefully placed it here, in the center of campus, the most prominent and heavily trafficked part of Furman," said Furman President Elizabeth Davis at the statue's unveiling on April 16. "It's facing outward, welcoming everyone, as Joe would have

done."

The Greenville Baha'i Community Drummers played as guest took their seats, honoring the faith Vaughn observed up to his death in 1991. The statue's creator, sculptor Steven Whyte, watched live from his studio in Carmel, California. Hundreds of students, faculty and staff joined around the mall.

After Davis welcomed the guests — including members of Vaughn's family, whom she thanked for "sharing your loved one with Furman" — other speakers stepped to the podium to remember the student and honor his legacy.

"There could not have been a more perfect pioneer than Joe Vaughn," said Ed Good '67, chair of Furman's Board of Trustees, who was in his second year on campus when Vaughn arrived. "But this statue does more than celebrate Joe Vaughn. It represents a turning point in civil rights and racial justice — for Furman, for Greenville and the Upstate, and for South Carolina."

After graduating, Vaughn began a long career teaching English in the Greenville County school system in 1969. After his retirement in 1982, colleagues remembered his tireless efforts to help his students and advocate for his fellow teachers, as president of the Greenville County Association of Teachers and the South Carolina Education Association.

Meanwhile, the work that began with Furman's integration in 1965 continued into the 21st century, with the creation of the university's Task Force on Slavery and Justice. Among the task force's recommendations were the construction of Joseph Vaughn Plaza and the establishment of Joseph Vaughn Day on Jan. 21.

Enrolling at Furman was

"the fulfillment of his dream" to get the best education possible, Vaughn told The Paladin student newspaper in 1965. The dream resonates today for a diverse array of students. "When I think of Joseph Vaughn, I see a man who fought to defend the lives of others — a man who dedicated his life to service," said Qwameek Bethea '21, president of Furman's NAACP chapter. Bethea lauded Vaughn's service as president of the Greenville and Southeastern NAACP chapters, as well as his leadership of peaceful protests against racial injustice in Greenville.

"The Furman University that stood in the 1960s is not the Furman University that stands here today," Bethea said. "But we must not let his legacy of change go unanswered."

Marcus Tate (video reflection), a cousin of Joseph Vaughn who attended Furman, agreed that the plaza and statue are a reminder of where Furman has been — and how far it has come.

"During my time here at Furman we have had countless events to raise awareness, but only for an hour, maybe a day, then shuffled this piece of history back into the archives," said Tate. "Now, there is a statue and plaza representing Furman's consistent move

forward in emphasizing that the only color that matters here on this campus is purple. Today is a testament that while no longer here, Joseph's work of equality and inspiring others to reach their full potential

continues now and for the years to come."

Furman Chief Diversity Officer Michael Jennings (video reflection) had a special message of gratitude.

"Most of all, I would like to thank Greenville's Black community," he said. "This is the community that nurtured Joseph Vaughn, that educated Joseph Vaughn and that inspired Joseph Vaughn to be who he was. In doing this, Greenville's Black community has given Furman a gift whose legacy will endure across time."

As the crowd counted down, Davis and Tate removed the purple drape from the statue, which will remain, as Davis noted, as "a beacon to everyone, but

especially to people of color, people who might feel marginalized, people who, like Joe, might at times feel like a majority of one."

"May they see Joe Vaughn's statue and know that they are welcome at Furman," she said. "May they also realize the courage required of Joe to be the first, and be reminded that courage lies within each and every one of us. Let us all feel inspired to do great and courageous things, as Joseph Vaughn did."

After the speeches were over and the Baha'i drums echoed, smiling students began lining up to take selfies with the new statue — welcoming Joseph Allen Vaughn to Furman once again.
