Lewis named new head football coach at Chesnee High School

The Spartanburg School District Two Board of Trustees recently approved Clay Lewis as the next Head Football Coach at Chesnee High School.

Lewis has been a coach at Hibriten High School in Lenoir, North Carolina since 1989. He has been the program's head coach since 2010.

Coach Lewis led the Hibriten Panthers to the 2AA State Championship in 2017. That year, the school finished 16-0. Last season the Panthers (14-1) returned to the 2AA championship game where they fell just 7 points short of a repeat. Over the past three seasons, Coach Lewis has led the Panthers to an overall record of 44-2, with three straight appearances in the 2AA State Championship Game.

"I am very excited about becoming the new head football coach at Chesnee High School," Lewis said. "After being the head coach of a successful program for the past nine years, I am looking for a challenge. It is my belief that with a lot of hard work, excellence is within this team's reach. First thing on the agenda will be building confidence in players through a demanding strength and conditioning program. I expect there to be noticeable differences in this team's performance on the field come August. I have heard that this is a community that gets behind its football team, and my family and I are ready to become a part of it."

Hub City Hog Fest set for April 5 - 6

The 2019 Hub City Hog Fest, a barbecue contest to benefit Mobile Meals of Spartanburg, will take place April 5 - 6. The City of Spartanburg will block off several roads downtown around Morgan Square to accommodate the dozens of cook teams that will compete in this annual BBQ competition.

On Friday, April 5,

entrance into the event from noon to 5 p.m. is FREE. After 5 p.m., wristbands must be purchased for \$5 each. On Saturday, April 6, from noon to 9pm, \$5 wristbands must be purchased. There will be chicken wing samples from the competition teams available from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Friday evening. The samples of

the competition teams' barbecue and ribs are ONLY AVAILABLE from noon to 2 p.m. on Saturday.

Vendors will be on site selling BBQ all weekend. Hog Bucks must be used to purchase food from vendors and to sample BBQ from competition teams (while supplies last).

S.C. Department of Health and Human Services to open new office in downtown Spartanburg

South Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, an entity whose mission is to purchase the most health for our citizens in need at the least possible cost to taxpayers, has agreed to occupy 19,667 square feet of office space in Spartanburg's 101 Pine office complex.

The lease includes the third and fourth floors, which are undergoing a complete upfit in preparation for occupation at the end of April. With this exciting addition, Johnson Development Associate's 101 Pine is 100% occupied. Spartanburg continues to demonstrate a growing demand and absorption of office, with Class A space at 99% occupancy and a job count of 25,241 within 1.5 miles of Morgan Square.

The announcement is the

first following the launch of the Economic Futures Group's Corporate Development Strategy. Designed to attract higher-wage white collar jobs to Spartanburg, the strategy is a result of the Spartanburg Chamber's OneSpartanburg initiative.

"It is always a pleasure to work with Johnson Development on properties and design spaces that strive to attract and retain great tenants. The newly renovated 19,500+/- sf of office space across the third and fourth floors of the building will provide a mix of offices, meeting rooms, and flexible, open work areas that house the various departments and personnel for SC DHHS. It's always exciting to be a part of the constant growth happening in Spartanburg and we are looking forward to seeing this project

completed in the coming months," stated William Gray, associate principal at McMillan Pazdan Smith and chairman of the Downtown Development Partnership.

"Another office building in Spartanburg has reached 100% occupancy. With seven colleges and the eighth fastest growing millennial population in the country, Spartanburg is firmly demonstrating its ability to recruit and retain corporate type talent. Announcements such as these indicate a need for more product and our ability to support back office projects," added Allen Smith, president & CEO of the Spartanburg Area Chamber of Commerce.

City Council approves contract to develop neighborhood transformation plan for Highland

It's the culmination of a process that brought together neighborhood leaders, City officials, and community stakeholders of all sizes, and after City Council's 6-0 vote on Monday, March 26, one of Spartanburg's most challenging areas of concentrated poverty can begin to plan for its renewal. APD Urban Planning and Management out of Atlanta was awarded a \$186,006 contract to create the Highland Master Plan, which is expected to take around 12 months to complete. City funding for the plan comes to \$76,006, with \$26,006 of that coming from Federal Community Block Development Grant funding.

Heavy on community

involvement and engagement, the process will take a look at Highland as a whole, both its assets and its challenges, ultimately creating a blueprint for everything from housing, public spaces, and transportation, to education at all levels and job training programs.

Also at Monday night's meeting, City Council heard an overview of a proposed continuum of supports for City families designed to significantly improve child wellbeing, boost future prosperity, and provide quantifiable financial benefits to the community well in excess of its cost. The concept, called Hello Family, would bring a number of existing services in the City under one umbrella in order to and link

their efforts and produce verifiable results by focusing on early intervention strategies. Based on the work of James J. Heckman, a Nobel Prize-winning economist who found that investing in programs targeted at the earliest years of life yield the most lasting and cost-effective results, Hello Family seeks to improve birth outcomes, reduce child abuse and neglect, and improve kindergarten readiness throughout the City of Spartanburg.

In all, Hello Family is expected to cost around \$8 million over 10 years, much of which would need to come through a private fundraising campaign, and federal funding that could support the program must be sought by May 22.

Learning to let your children make mistakes

What parent doesn't want to protect their children, to see them safe, healthy and happy? Such concerns are part of our DNA, inherited from our cave dwelling ancestors and their dangerous world. While today's kids don't need protection from saber-toothed tigers, there are still numerous ways for children to make mistakes. As parents we need to realize that some mistakes are "good mistakes," errors in decision making that may result in the wrong outcomes, but that can be valuable learning experiences for our children.

Parents always have a responsibility to try and keep truly dire, life-threatening consequences from occurring. But trying to ensure that children never make a bad decision, whether as toddlers, teens or even young adults, is really not doing them any favors.

The modern term for overly-protective moms and dads is "helicoptering." It describes parents who constantly are hovering over their child, trying to ensure that all goes well. It's parents keeping in constant contact and trying to help their child make all the right decisions.

Unfortunately, being over-protective can inhibit a child's natural growth and independence. When Dad is up all night finishing that school science project, it isn't helping prepare the child for the future. Kids with overly-protective parents often have trouble making their own decisions because they know mom or dad is always there to jump in. Such children can also end up rebelling strongly as their desire and need for independence grows.

And no, it isn't always easy to give your kids room to make their own decisions, good or bad. However it's important that they do so for healthy development. And parents can still be involved. You can be there while they work through their dilemmas and to help point them toward good solutions, but your job isn't to find the solutions for them.

Yes, you should be ready to step in when a child's decision could be dangerous or life threatening, but giving your kids more space helps build confidence and independence. It encourages them to try new things, even things that might seem scary. You want to offer sympathy and understanding when things go wrong, but don't always try to make things right.

When a child is allowed to face possible failure, and even sometimes to experience it, he or she will learn valuable lessons about growing up.

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Former Upstate superintendent honored at gala

Columbia - Three accomplished South Carolina public school graduates and three lifelong educators were honored at a recent gala.

The South Carolina Foundation for Educational Leadership, South Carolina Association of School Administrators' (SCASA) non-profit arm, hosted its third annual gala on Friday, March 29th at the Columbia Marriott to celebrate the impact of public education and how it contributed to the personal careers and achievements of the six honorees.

2019 Distinguished South Carolina Public School Graduates:

Craig Melvin (Columbia High School, Richland District One) of NBC News' *TODAY* describes the significance of his public education, "If it weren't for my public school teachers and administrators in South Carolina, I'm fairly certain I wouldn't be 'distinguished' at anything. As a student at H.B. Rhame Elementary, St. Andrews Middle, and Columbia High, I reaped the benefits of having a support system that was genuinely interested in seeing me thrive. They were patient nurturers who cultivated my curiosity. Several of my teachers were especially patient with the kid who didn't always raise his hand, sit still, or keep his thoughts to himself. Many saw something in me before I saw it in myself. I'm forever thankful for them... I dedicate (this recognition) to them—the underappreciated, over worked, but impactful group of SC educators who lifted a kid from Columbia, SC, and gave him the confidence and skills he needed to become a journalist."

Lou Kennedy (Lexington High School, Lexington District One), president, CEO, and owner of Nephron Pharmaceuticals Corporation, also discussed her connection to public education, "I am honored to receive the South Carolina Distinguished Public School Graduate award. It is particularly humbling to be included with such remarkable peers. This

recognition allows us to highlight the success that may be achieved with a fantastic public school system. I am forever thankful for my Lexington County education, and certainly the foundation I received from my years at the University of South Carolina. Many teachers are responsible for inspiring me to do my best, none more so than my mother. As my first-grade teacher, she encouraged me to excel, not only with grades but in all things. My father was a 15-year night instructor with Midlands Technical College, so you could say that education is truly a part of my DNA."

Dr. Anne Lamb Matthews (Lake City High School, Florence District Three), the first woman to be named Vice President of Rotary International, and the first woman to serve on both the Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees and the Rotary International Board of Directors, said of her South Carolina public education, "In all honesty, I received the very best public education one could possibly receive. The public school preparation has given me a rewarding life, having reached the pinnacle of a career where I served as the leader of several national education organizations and in key leadership roles in Rotary International. In addition, I have traveled and worked or spoken in 68 countries and all 50 states. The foundation for my wonderful, rewarding career and life must be attributed to the academic preparation

given to me by teachers. My sincere and humbling appreciation for this tremendous honor must be dedicated to my teachers."

In addition to honoring these distinguished public school graduates, the SC Foundation for Educational Leadership is inducting three public school leaders into the South Carolina Educator Hall of Fame.

The 2019 South Carolina Educator Hall of Fame Inductees:

Dr. Cyril Busbee (posthumous)
 A graduate of Wagener High School (Aiken County) in 1924, Dr. Busbee was a lifelong educator and was elected SC Superintendent of Education three times. As SC Superintendent from 1966-1979, Dr. Busbee oversaw the integration of South Carolina's public schools.

Joseph Kenyon "Ken"

East (posthumous)

A graduate of Lineville High School (Lineville, AL) in 1929, Mr. East started the first public kindergarten program in South Carolina. He was greatly responsible for the founding of what is now Coastal Carolina University and is considered the "Father of Adult Education in South Carolina."

Dr. Karen Woodward

Dr. Karen Callison Woodward is a 1960 graduate of Greenwood High School in Greenwood District 50. After earning degrees from the University of South Carolina and the University of Georgia, she spent a 50-year-long career in public education focused on advocacy for children and their futures and the significance of public education in service to the community. Recognized for her strategic forward thinking and innovative leadership, she has received numerous local, regional, and national honors including South Carolina Superintendent of the Year, National Superintendent of the Year finalist, South Carolina Career Woman of the Year, a national Tech Savvy Superintendent, and the Governor's Educational Champion of the Year. In 2014, the American Association of School Administrators (AASA) presented Dr. Woodward with the AASA Women in School Leadership Award, which recognizes the exceptional leadership of active, front-line female administrators who make a difference in the lives of

students every day. Dr. Woodward has taken on leadership roles in state-wide efforts to improve educational opportunities for all children, including serving on the South Carolina Education and Economic Development Act Task Force and chairing the Curriculum Framework and Guidance Committee. She led the South Carolina Statewide Task Force for World Class Funding and provided leadership for numerous South Carolina Association of School Administrators' (SCASA) committees, including the committee on defining the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate. She also served as president of SCASA from 1988-1989. With 31 years of experience as a district superintendent for Union County Schools, Anderson District Five, and Lexington District One, Dr. Woodward has demonstrated unwavering support for public education. Under her leadership, each district she served has undergone tremendous growth and change. In expanding world language programs, building new schools, and pioneering new learning and leadership practices, she has improved each community and prepared her students to be life-long learners. Dr. Woodward embraces collaborating with educators, businesses, and local communities on transforming public education to a 21st century system of learning.

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Four simple hacks to beat seasonal allergies

problems." Get relevant information about weather and allergies in the palm of your hand so you can avoid the worst of it, or make necessary preparations when you can't. One useful tool is AccuWeather's daily allergy index, which is available on AccuWeather.com and on the free AccuWeather

app for iOS and Android. Stay in-the-know by frequently checking the app, which is also a good source of other weather-related tips, educational resources and information.

Fresh air may sound appealing, but opening your car and home's windows is

a fast-track to a high pollen count indoors. For a breeze, stick to air conditioning, as fans can kick up dust and pollen into the air.

Consider Your Wardrobe

For those times when you must be out and about on high-pollen count days, wear a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses to protect yourself. A scarf or mask over your mouth and nose can be useful when symptoms are severe. When you get home, be sure to remove outerwear, including shoes, in your mud room or foyer so you don't track allergens throughout the house, particularly in areas where you sleep and spend the most time. You can make smart decisions about your wardrobe as well as the best time to venture outdoors by consulting digital apps like AccuWeather before leaving the house.

This spring, don't let sniffles, sneezing and wheezing get the best of you. For a more comfortable season, check the weather often and take proper precautions.

Developed and sustained by museum professionals for over 45 years, the Alliance's museum accreditation program is the field's primary vehicle for quality assurance, self-regulation and public accountability. It strengthens the museum profession by promoting practices that enable leaders to make informed decisions, allocate resources wisely, and remain financially and ethically accountable in order to provide the best possible service to the public.

"We are extremely proud to once again receive this recognition," said Willie Calloway, executive director of the State Museum. "The museum commission, foundation board, staff and volunteers have and will always remain focused and committed to excellence, as we serve as the primary storyteller of South Carolina."

Of the nation's estimated 33,000 museums, over 1070 are currently accredited. Only 10% of the nation's multidisciplinary museums are accredited and only 7% of state governed museums.

Accreditation is a very rigorous but highly rewarding process that examines all aspects of a museum's operations. To earn accreditation a museum first must conduct a

year of self-study, and then undergo a site visit by a team of peer reviewers. AAM's Accreditation Commission, an independent and autonomous body of museum professionals, considers the self-study

and visiting committee report to determine whether a museum should receive accreditation.

"Accredited museums are a community of institutions that have chosen to hold themselves publicly

accountable to excellence," said Laura L. Lott, Alliance president and CEO. "Accreditation is clearly a significant achievement, of which both the institutions and the communities they

serve can be extremely proud."

Founded in 1988, the State Museum is celebrating 30 years as the state's largest and most comprehensive museum. As the storyteller of South Caro-

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Nearly 100 million Americans will embark on family vacations this year
