Spartanburg County Council member graduates from the Institute of Government for County Officials

Thirty-one county officials graduated on August 3 from Levels I and II of the Institute of Government for County Officials at SCAC's 53rd Annual Conference, held August 1 - 3.

Jack A. Mabry, Spartanburg County Council Member graduated from Level I.

The Institute of Government for County Officials provides county officials the opportunity to enhance their skills and abilities to function more effectively. SCAC partners with the Joseph P. Riley Jr. Center for Livable Communities, College of Charleston, to offer the Institute of Government three times per year. Clemson University's Master of Public Administration program sponsors the Institute.

County officials must complete 27 hours of instruction to graduate from Level I, and 18 hours of instruction to graduate from Level II.

South Carolina Federal merges with Spartanburg City Employees Credit Union

N. Charleston - South Carolina Federal Credit Union has announced its completed merger with Spartanburg City Employees Credit Union following a member vote in June.

Upstate lands 185 student-athletes on Big South Presidential Honor Roll

Charlotte, N.C. - The Big South Conference announced recently that USC Upstate placed 185 student-athletes on the Big South Presidential Honor Roll. Additionally, Upstate was one of just six member institutions to have at least 70 percent of its student-athletes make the list. Specifically, 72.27 percent of 256 Spartan student-athletes were honored for their academic accomplishments.

To be named to the Presidential Honor Roll, student-athletes must maintain a grade point average of 3.0 (on a 4.0 scale) or better for the recently-completed academic year. This past season, 2,264 out of 3,492 eligible student-athletes in the Big South achieved the benchmark. A league-record 64.83 percent of eligible student-athletes earned Presidential Honor Roll status for their work in the classroom, which is the first time that mark has been above 60 percent in conference history.

USC Upstate student-athletes are coming off the highest departmental GPA in school history with a 3.59 this past spring.

SCC holds 2020 graduation parade

On Thursday, August 6, Spartanburg Community College recognized its 2020 graduates at a first-ever graduation parade held at the College's Giles Campus in Spartanburg.

SCC awarded approximately 400 degrees, diplomas and certificates to graduating students poised to continue their education or begin work in high-growth, high-demand careers. Graduates also included local high school students who are part of the Viking Early College and the Spartanburg County Early College High School.

"Due to COVID-19 restrictions, our traditional in-person graduation celebration could not be held so our goal was to plan an alternative celebration that was special, fun and safe for everyone," explains Celia Bauss, SCC registrar. "We surveyed graduates and their overwhelming response was that they wanted a graduation event that included their families so we planned a parade where faculty and staff will celebrate our graduates."

Approximately 110 SCC graduates participated in the parade along with any of their family or friends who fit into their car. The parade route began off Brisack Road, weaving through the campus with SCC faculty and staff cele-

brating graduates along the way and providing programs, water and gifts. The parade then concluded with graduates receiving their diploma cover and a photo with Dr. G. Michael

Spartanburg community receives \$4.4 million grant to combat teen pregnancy

The Spartanburg Regional Foundation has been awarded a three-year, \$4.4 million federal grant to reduce teen pregnancy. The grant will support a coalition of organizations working together to address high teen pregnancy rates and prevent related negative health outcomes.

"We're so excited to bring national funding to Spartanburg to support local needs," said Kristy Caradori, executive director of the Spartanburg Regional Foundation. "We are grateful to our program partners because this award would not have been possible without their commitment and expertise."

This new grant will expand and build on coordinated community efforts in Spartanburg that began more than 10 years ago. While this latest grant is led by the Spartanburg Regional Foundation, it represents a collaboration that includes program partners, such as the Spartanburg Joint Funders, the Spartanburg Community Indicators Project, and state and national teen pregnancy prevention experts. The Mary Black Foundation shepherded this work for the past five years prior to the new grant award and will remain an integral partner.

"We are thrilled to see

these resources continue to support efforts that improve the lives of young people, and we look forward to being part of this ongoing community-wide partnership," said Molly Talbot-Metz, president and CEO of the Mary Black Foundation.

Tackling the challenge of teen pregnancy in Spartanburg County has been a collaborative effort for more than a decade. In 2007, the Spartanburg Community Indicators Project published data establishing the link between teen pregnancy and poverty, low educational attainment, and the poor health of newborns. The Spartanburg Joint Funders - the Spartanburg Regional Foundation, the Mary Black Foundation, the Spartanburg County Foundation and United Way of the Piedmont - followed up by investing in the South Carolina Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy's work in Spartanburg County.

Federal grants followed, leading to the creation of the Connect initiative. Managed by the Mary Black Foundation, Connect brought together key partners to address the needs of adolescents through evidence-based, holistic strategies.

"It is essential to identify

root causes, build resilience, improve systems, and adopt best practices to impact youth over the continuum of adolescence," said program director Polly Edwards-Padgett. "I believe Connect has done that."

Since 2008, Spartanburg County has seen a 66 percent decrease in the rate of teens giving birth. Still, there is more work to be done. Overall, Spartanburg County continues to exceed the national rate of teen pregnancy. And there are areas of the county where the high incidence of teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases are especially persistent.

When the opportunity to apply for additional federal funding arose, the Spartanburg Regional Foundation agreed to step into the lead role.

"Our trustees recognized how important it was to continue this work in our community, and they were eager for the Foundation to provide this support," Caradori said. "The mission of the Foundation includes bolstering community health and wellness initiatives. Teen health is critical to Spartanburg County's present and future, and we are excited about this opportunity to make a difference moving forward."

Celebrate bounty of summer fruits

This summer has produced a bountiful crop of fruits. My local farmers market and grocery store have supplied an abundance of budget-friendly ingredients for my favorite summer dishes. While I often take advantage of the fruits on sale, I sometimes have questions about how to prepare and store them.

The following tips can help you prepare and enjoy fresh fruits and keep them at their most flavorful. The recipe for Rainbow Fruit Salad also is a great way to use a variety of your favorite fruits.

Which fruits continue to ripen after they're picked?

Apriots, bananas, cantaloupe, kiwi, mangoes, nectarines, peaches, pears, plums and plums continue to ripen at room temperature after they're picked. To speed their ripening, put them in a loosely closed brown paper bag or ripening bowl at room temperature. (NOTE: Ripening bowls are sold at many stores that sell kitchen supplies for the home.)

Plastic bags don't work for ripening. Once fully ripened, fruits may be stored in the refrigerator to lengthen their storage time. Though the outside skin of a refrigerated banana will turn dark brown, the inside will remain light-colored.

Fruits that should be picked or bought ripe and ready to eat include apples, cherries, grapefruit, grapes, oranges, pineapple, strawberries, tangerines and watermelon.

RAINBOW FRUIT SALAD

You can use any combination of fruits including the ones suggested below to make your salad.

- 1 large mango, peeled and diced
- 2 cups fresh blueberries
- 2 nectarines, unpeeled and sliced
- 2 cups fresh strawberries, halved
- 2 cups seedless grapes
- 2 bananas, sliced
- 1 kiwifruit, peeled and diced

1. Prepare the fruit.
2. Combine all ingredients, and mix.
3. Just before serving, pour Honey-Orange Sauce (see recipe below) over fruit. Makes 12 servings.

- **Schedule early:** Many dentists are seeing fewer patients daily than they did before dental practices were closed earlier this year for routine visits. This is to ensure all science-based guidance and safety protocols are followed. Factor this in, and call to schedule an appointment as early as possible. This will help ensure your child gets in before school starts.



- **Know what to expect:** Dental visits have changed in the COVID-19 era. When making your appointment, ask about waiting room procedures, whether you can go back with your child, and other considerations.

"Some things at the dental office may look different, so talk to your child

before the appointment and let them know these changes are in place to help keep people safe. For example, your dentist may be using different protective equipment like masks that cover more of their face, as well as goggles, face shields and gowns," says Dr. Sahota. "It may all seem strange to your child, but a conversation ahead

of time can help put them at ease. Remind them that underneath the mask and shield, it's still their same doctor."

- **Why check-ups matter:** Poor oral health can have a detrimental effect on a child's quality of life and future, however prevention and early detection of dental conditions can help

avoid pain, trouble eating, difficulty speaking and school absences.

Keep in mind that dental issues are more common than you may think. Tooth decay (cavities) is one of the most common chronic conditions of childhood in the U.S., reports the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, with about one in five chil-

dren ages 5-11 having at least one untreated decayed tooth. At the appointment, ask your dentist about your child's overall dental health, as well if he or she spotted any cavities. This is also a good time to inquire about sealants, which can reduce the risk of cavities by 80 percent. If your child plays sports, a dental appointment is also an opportunity for your dentist to check their mouth guard for wear, tear and fit.

To send your child off to class with a healthy smile, it's important to schedule a back-to-school dental visit. Not only are they required by some school districts, but they're essential for oral and overall health.

Team of scientists, including S.C. State Museum Curator, discover two new 40 to 65 million-year-old fossil shark species in the Southeastern U.S.

Columbia - A team of scientists is recently announced the discovery of two new fossil shark species from the southeastern U.S. The team is headed by David Cicimurri, Curator of Natural History, South Carolina State Museum in Columbia, along with Jun Ebersole, Director of Collections, McWane Science Center, Birmingham, AL, and George Martin, retired USDA soil scientist from Auburn, AL. The two new species date from the Paleogene Period, roughly 65 and 35 million years ago, respectively, and were named based on hundreds of isolated teeth that were discovered in south Alabama and central Georgia.

The two new species are members of the same genus, *Mennerotodus*, a group of extinct sharks that were known previously from only Europe and Asia. The older species, *Mennerotodus mackayi*, was discovered in Alabama and lived during the Paleocene Epoch. According to Ebersole, "this new species appeared just after the extinction of the dinosaurs, and based on the number of teeth we recovered, it was likely one of the more common species in the ancient Gulf of Mexico 65 million years ago". This extinct shark species was named for John L. Mackay, the initial President and CEO of McWane Science Center and is in honor of Mackay's lifelong career in furthering informal education.

The second shark, *Mennerotodus parmleyi*, lived during the Eocene Epoch, roughly 35 million years ago. This new shark, according to Cicimurri, was named from hundreds of teeth recovered from a defunct kaolinite mine in central Georgia. "These teeth were originally identified as two or three different species", said Cicimurri, "but our reanalysis of the teeth showed they instead belonged to an entirely

new species." This new species was named for Dr. Dennis Parmley, retired professor at Georgia College and State University, in honor of his contributions to the study of fossils in Georgia.

Before naming these two species, the team of scientists spent months reconstructing the dentitions of these ancient sharks from hundreds of isolated teeth and comparing them to modern species. According to Cicimurri, "by piecing together and examining the dentitions of these new shark species, we were able to determine that they are closely related to modern Sandtiger Sharks, so close in fact, that we were able to use modern Sandtiger jaws to reconstruct them."

"Like in modern Sandtiger Sharks, the front teeth in the mouths of the fossil species are very tall and fang-like" said Ebersole. "These teeth often project out of the mouth, giving the shark a snaggle-toothed appearance, and were perfect for feeding on fishes, crabs, squids, and even other sharks", he continued.

After examining additional teeth from various museum collections, the team was able to conclude that *Mennerotodus* teeth are relatively common in the southeastern U.S. According to Cicimurri, "both shark species can be found in Alabama, and we were also able to confirm *Mennerotodus mackayi* teeth in Arkansas." "These teeth are significant because they represent the first occurrence of *Mennerotodus* in North America," said Ebersole, "and because the *Mennerotodus mackayi* teeth in Alabama are older than those from other parts of the world, it strongly suggests that this group of sharks originated right here in the ancient Gulf of Mexico."

The study, titled *Two new species of Mennerotodus Zhelezko, 1994 (Chondrichthyes: Lamniformes; Odontaspidae), from the*

Paleogene of the southeastern United States, was published in the open access journal *Fossil Record* and can be downloaded at:

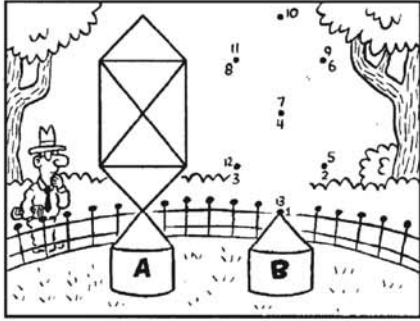
