Spartanburg County to replace bridge on Belcher Road
 Boiling Springs - The Spartanburg County Roads & Bridges Department has partnered with the County Transportation Committee (CTC) to replace the existing bridge on Belcher Road, across Lawsons Fork Creek. Construction on this project to begin in the Fall of 2022.

Spartanburg County contracted a flood study of Lawsons Fork Creek, and the study indicated that the 100-year flood elevation was about six feet above the existing bridge elevation. Testimonies from residents in the area further confirmed the results from that study. These findings contributed to the proposal for a bridge that would be eight feet higher than the current bridge. This proposed bridge will be slightly downstream from the existing one. At some point in the construction process, expectations are to close Belcher Road and set up a detour.

The contract for this \$2.7 million project has been signed with Dane Construction out of Charlotte, NC. The company has successfully completed bridge projects for Spartanburg County in the past.

The Noble Tree Foundation was founded in 1999 by Roger Milliken to promote education and activities relating to the knowledge and planting of Noble Trees in Spartanburg County. The Foundation's annual contest helps recognize the largest and most notable specimen trees in the county.

The annual contest provides the Foundation with an opportunity to map out these grand trees, which they describe as tall, substantial trees that will endure for generations and become fixtures in a landscape. The cedar tree at SMC fits the description as it's estimated to be more than a century old and is certainly one of the more memorable landmarks on the campus.

As the winner of the contest, the Foundation made a donation to Hatcher Garden in Abraham's name for \$2,500 to continue promoting conservation.

Carver's legacy

Spartanburg's Carver High School played a key role in integrating Wofford

Al Gray '71 and Doug Jones '69 are familiar names in Wofford College's history. Gray was the college's first Black student. Jones was the first Black student to graduate from the college while Gray's studies were interrupted during the Vietnam War.

Both were graduates of Spartanburg's Carver High School, and they were joined on Wofford's campus by a few of their Carver schoolmates to help desegregate the college in the late 1960s and early 1970s. Many of those alumni are continuing to make a difference for today's students and future generations of Terriers.

Six of them have established an endowed scholarship to support Wofford students pursuing internships. They're continuing a legacy.

"Carver High School and Cumming Street School teachers often came to support us no matter what we were doing," says Rudy Long '73, who was one of the first two Black student-athletes on the Wofford football team and a charter member of the college's chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

Long, who lives in Columbia, South Carolina, and many of his classmates describe themselves as being part of a pipeline that was intentionally established from Carver High School.

Alumni contributing to the Carver Legacy Scholarship are: James Cheek '73, Phillip Fant '74, Gwen Prince-

Lawrence '73, Gray, Jones and Long. Memorial donations were made in honor of William Hunter '73, Donald Gene Robinson '73, Jennifer Foster-Dean '74 and Bobby Leach, a former assistant dean at Wofford and the college's first Black administrator. "I was involved in everything at Carver," says Gray, a Wofford trustee from 1998-2010. "I got here and learned to be very individualistic. Everyone would ask me how I could be so isolated, and I said, 'You adapt and learn. It's a defense mechanism.' That worked well for me, and my focus was on academics."

The college's administration recognized the need to recruit more Black students and built a relationship with Carver High School. Earlier this year, Cheek and Fant established scholarships at Wofford, and Cheek reminisced about visiting Wofford's campus for a recruiting event and having a conversation with a man he thought was a professor. When he returned to Carver that Monday morning, he learned that he was talking to Wofford's president, Dr. Paul Hardin III, and he was encouraged to compete for a Wofford scholarship, which was awarded to him.

The college's early Black students made concerted efforts to get involved with campus clubs and organizations to pave the way for others.

"It was a transition for me as well as my professors and fellow classmates coming from a segregated society," Long says.

Prince-Lawrence, who lives in Statesville, North Carolina, was one of the first women to attend the college. She was a day student before Wofford began admitting women as residential students. She transferred from Stillman College in Alabama and had a young family.

"It never occurred to me that I was breaking a barrier," says Prince-Lawrence.

Prince-Lawrence, who was the valedictorian of her Carver High School class in 1967, and her family lived on Evins Street while she was a Wofford student. She had a full-time job and family commitments and wasn't too active on campus. She was joined at Wofford by another woman who was a Carver valedictorian, Janice Means '73, who also was married with a family and working full-time after transferring from Benedict College.

The Carver Legacy Scholarship will give special priority to descendants of Carver High School alumni and students who attended Carver Middle School (Spartanburg District 7 transitioned Carver to a junior high and middle school after local public schools were desegregated).

Cheek says the scholarship lends credence to a line from the Carver High School alma mater that said, "Your name to us will never die."

Spartanburg community mourns the loss of OTO Development CEO Corry W. Oakes, III

Corry W. Oakes III, co-founder and CEO of OTO Development, passed away unexpectedly on Sunday, August 7, leaving behind his beloved wife, Amy, and their three daughters Ashley, Elizabeth and Lauren.

"Corry was a beloved leader and a dear friend to so many in our community and our industry," says Todd Turner, co-founder and VP/Real Estate at OTO Development, which is part of The Johnson Group. "His impact on our lives is as immeasurable as the grief we feel and the love for him and his family."

Oakes and Turner, along with Jim Ovenden, provided their initials to name the hotel development and hospitality management company they founded alongside George Dean Johnson Jr. and the late H. Wayne Huizenga in May 2004.

George Dean Johnson Jr., Oakes' long-time mentor and business partner, and Geordy Johnson and Susanna Johnson Shannon shared a statement on behalf of The Johnson Group and the Johnson family: "Corry was more than just the consummate professional and leader in the lodging industry. He was a tremendous community servant, a mentor to all he worked with, a loving father and family man, and a most trusted advisor on so many different levels to our family. Words cannot describe how deeply he will be missed."

A native of Lawrenceville, Georgia, Oakes moved to Upstate South Carolina in 1985 to attend Wofford College, where he played outside linebacker for the Terriers. After earning a bachelor's degree in business economics, he held roles of increasing responsibility with Johnson's WJB Blockbuster Video and then Extended Stay America, where he served as President and Chief Operating Officer. As an NYSE-listed lodging chain, ESA thrived under his leadership, becoming the fastest-growing owner-operated hotel chain in lodging history prior to its sale to Blackstone. OTO Development was founded on the very day the ESA sale closed.

Dedicated to his alma mater, Oakes served as a member of Wofford's Terrier Club Board of Directors, President's Advisory Board and Wofford College Board of Trustees from 2009-2021. He served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees from 2019-2021.

City Council hears update on lead paint abatement program

Spartanburg City Council heard an update in July about the City's "Lead-Safe Spartanburg" program, a lead paint abatement assistance program available for both owner-

occupied and rental units in the city. Funded by a \$1 million grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in 2019, the program so far has assisted with lead paint remediation in 24 homes according to program manager, David Maher.

The program is still accepting new applicants that meet the following requirements:

- Home must be located within the City of Spartanburg
- A Child under the age of 6 must reside or regularly spend time in the home (over 60 hours per year), or a pregnant woman must

reside in the home

- Household income must be less than 80% of Area Median Income
- Home must be built prior to 1978
- All property tax payments and homeowner's insurance must be current
