The South Carolina Arts Commission (SCAC) has awarded the South Carolina Governors Award for the Arts to seven recipients who have made major contributions to the progression of culture and arts in South Carolina.

Over the years, Spartanburg County has established itself as a leading arts and cultural hub in the state. To date, there have been 14 Spartanburg County-based honorees proving that Spartanburg is one of the most dedicated and exceptional communities to experience and enjoy the Arts. Chapman Cultural Center CEO Jennifer Evins won the award in the 'Individual' category.

City Council tables proposed change to Spartanburg's local historic preservation rules

On Monday, February 8th, City Council voted to table a proposed change to the City's local historic preservation rules and the nomination of the former Mary H. Wright Elementary School building to City's local historic register.

The proposed rule change would've altered City Code to read that when proposed modifications to a locally designated historic property have been approved by the State Office of Historic Preservation (SHPO), those same modifications would only need to be approved by the City at the staff level without a separate review by the City's Historic Architecture Review Board (HARB). City Manager Chris Story explained in a memo to City Council that the change is meant to accommodate developments that must seek approval from SHPO, which uses the same governing standards used by HARB. According to the memo, the proposed rule change was meant to avoid the complication of potentially having a development approved by SHPO but not approved by HARB and would ultimately strengthen local historic preservation efforts, saying that the current rules create "a point or risk and uncertainty that could dissuade others from taking on such projects."

Several City Council members cited concerns that the proposed rule change seemed too closely tied to the planned redevelopment of the former Mary H. Wright Elementary School and ultimately voted 6-1 to postpone the matter until HARB can weigh-in on the proposed change before Council's next meeting. Council member Rob Rain voted against. Council then voted to postpone the vote to add the former Mary H. Wright Elementary School to the local historic register until the proposed rule change is evaluated by HARB. Council members Erica Brown, Jerome Rice, and Meghan Smith voted against.

Winter squash is healthy addition to any meal

Winter squash are prominently displayed at grocery stores in the fall and winter months, but many shoppers pass them by because they don't know how to make them. Winter squash are easy to prepare and are a healthy addition to any meal.

The Cucurbitaceae family is the Latin name for gourds, pumpkins and squash. The terms Summer and Winter can be deceptive. Summer squash types are on the market all winter; Winter squash types can be found in late summer and fall, as well as winter. This terminology was never meant to confuse – it just dates to a time when the seasons were more crucial to man's survival than they are now. Vegetables that would keep until December became known as winter vegetables.

Winter squash are picked when they are fully mature, and they have a thick, inedible skin. This thick skin provides a protective covering for the squash and allows for a long storage life. Winter squash can be stored for three months or longer in a cool, dry place, preferably in a single layer.

Every part of the squash plant can be eaten, including the leaves and tender shoots, which can be cooked in omelets or made into soup. Winter squash are a good source of vitamins A and C, potassium and fiber. One-half cup of cooked winter squash has only 40 calories. Some of the most popular types of winter squash are butternut, spaghetti, acorn squash and Delicata.

* Butternut squash is tan in color and has a long, bell-like shape.

* Spaghetti squash is oblong or oval in shape and yellow in color.

* Acorn squash is actually shaped like an acorn. It is dark green and has a ridged rind or skin.

* Delicata squash is oblong, ridged, and yellow and green. The skin is soft and edible.

When shopping, look for squash that are heavy for their size, free of soft spots and have a dull sheen (a shiny skin is an indicator the squash is not fully mature).

Once butternut or acorn squash is cooked and cooled, it can be peeled away from the skin, cut into cubes, and used in soups, stews and casseroles along with other vegetables. Butternut or acorn squash can be used interchangeably in recipes.

Spaghetti squash is the exception. Once it is cooked, use a fork to peel the flesh away from the skin. It looks just like spaghetti as it peels away. Sauce and serve spaghetti squash like regular noodles.

Delicata squash is the easiest squash to prep and cook because of its soft, edible skin. It contains seeds in the center, but they can be easily removed by scraping them out with a spoon.

Keeping the Faith: Rev. Dr. Ron Robinson carries on tradition in a most non-traditional way

The Imposition of Ashes, observed on the first day of Lent, was held on the portico behind Main Building. Because of COVID-19, it was a contactless ceremony, with prepackaged ashes handed out to those who gathered. As "Amazing Grace" played over a speaker, the attendees dipped a finger into the package and marked a cross on their foreheads.

"Ash Wednesday is always a well-attended service on campus, particularly when it's in a warm setting," says Robinson.

"In fact, we always run out of seats, so we usually do it several times. About 70 percent of our students come from liturgical Christian traditions, where Ash Wednesday is very important. I love that it is

both Catholic and Protestant, too. It has been important to Christians for centuries and to the campus for a long time. I felt like we needed to figure out a creative way to do it." Lucy Person '23, a psy-

chology and Spanish major from Charlotte, North Carolina, wasn't certain the ceremony would take place this year because of COVID. She was pleased to learn that it would and enjoyed having it out-

doors. "In some ways it makes you feel closer to God," Person says. "Traditionally it's nice to have the thumb of someone else make the cross on your forehead, but there was something

deeply personal about doing it yourself."

Grayson Carter '22, a religion major from Charlotte, also enjoyed participating in the service while standing in the sunshine.

"I was always taught that church doesn't happen just in a building," Carter says. "And I think it's wonderful that it's open to people of all faith backgrounds."

For Robinson, the ceremony was the fulfillment of a promise made on the first day of the semester.

"I was over in the bookstore and a student, who I didn't know, looked across the bookstore and said, 'Hi Rev. Ron. I hope we'll have Ash Wednesday this year, I'll be there.' And I thought yes, we will. We sure will. It matters."

Q. Who is the actor who plays the racist cop on "The Rookie"? My husband said he once played Superman, but I told him that actor is on another show we watch called "The Witcher." Is it the same person? —Y.G.

A. You're both right! There have been several incarnations of DC Comics' Superman since the Christopher Reeve era, the most recent having starred Henry Cavill in 2013's "Man of Steel," followed by "Batman v Superman" and "Justice League." Cavill, sporting long white hair, is the actor who plays the monster hunter in the hit fantasy series "The Witcher" on Netflix.

"The Rookie's" Brandon Routh was cast as Clark Kent/Superman in the 2006 film "Superman Returns," with Kevin Spacey, but it didn't deliver at the box office, so he faded into obscurity for a while. Fortunately, the DC Universe must like him because he went on to play either Superman or "The Atom" in several CW series like "The Flash" and "Arrow."

In December, Routh, now 41, was cast on the third season of the ABC drama "The Rookie" as an officer with polarizing views and actions. The role is recurring, but it gives him a chance to play against type, the opposite of a superhero.

A. "The Rifleman" is a classic Western that ran for five seasons from 1958 to 1963. It starred Chuck Connors as a rancher and Johnny Crawford as his young son, Mark. The number of shots that Connors fires during the opening credits appears to my ears to be 13.

He subsequently guest-starred on such notable series as "Hawaii Five-O," "Little House on the Prairie" and "Murder, She Wrote." He and his on-screen father Connors remained close friends, and Crawford delivered the eulogy when Connors passed away in 1992.

More than half of Carolinians are uncomfortable traveling during the COVID-19 pandemic

Charlotte, N.C. – A new AAA travel survey, conducted in January, reveals that 64% of North Carolinians and 59% of South Carolinians are uncomfortable traveling during the COVID-19 pandemic. The main concerns are:

- * Fears of getting sick (60% - NC) (67% - SC)
- * New strains of the virus (58% - NC) (63% - SC)
- * The number of COVID-19 cases (68% - NC) (58% - SC)

The travel industry has been hit hard by this pandemic. Nearly two-thirds of North Carolinians

(63%) and South Carolinians (60%) cancelled or rescheduled travel plans in 2020. Currently, nearly half (40%) of North Carolinians and half (50%) of South Carolinians are comfortable staying in a hotel, while only 23% of North Carolinians and 25% of South Carolinians feel comfortable taking a commercial flight. The majority (82%) of North Carolinians and (89%) of South Carolinians feel most comfortable traveling in their personal vehicle.

With more known about the virus and how it spreads, there appears to be growing confidence

among some travelers. Nearly a quarter (18%) of North Carolinians and (20%) of South Carolinians say they are more comfortable traveling now than when the pandemic began – 15 combined percentage points more than when we last surveyed in October. Their growing confidence was attributed to:

- * Implementation of mask use and cleaning policies (39% - NC) (47% - SC)
- * More knowledge about

how the virus spreads (28% - NC) (38% - SC)

* Quarantine fatigue/ wanting to get out of the house (27% - NC) (31% - SC)

This year, 54% of North Carolinians and 58% of South Carolinians plan to take at least one vacation of 3 days or more. Additionally, about 2 in 5 residents say they will feel more comfortable traveling after receiving both doses of the Covid-19 vaccine (40% - NC) (38% - SC) and when cases begin

to decrease (45% - NC) (38% - SC).

"The Covid-19 vaccine is essential to restoring Americans' confidence in traveling again," said Tiffany Wright, spokesperson, AAA – The Auto Club Group in the Carolinas. "With health experts predicting widespread vaccinations by the summer, AAA Travel Advisors are seeing growing interest in travel bookings for the second half of the year."

Additional survey highlights:

(83% - NC and SC) will wear a mask in public while traveling

(39% - NC) (38% - SC) are more likely to visit a destination with a mask mandate

(52% - NC) (49% - SC) are driving less due to the pandemic

(37% - NC and SC) are more likely to purchase travel insurance than before the pandemic

(76% - NC and SC) will not travel in Q1 / (50% - NC) (53% - SC) cite the pandemic as a reason why

"I originally thought I'd bring in six guys, but I wasn't sure about two of them. These four seem like the best combination for success. I hope they get along."

We heard thundering on the stairs as his formerly homeless renters came down to the kitchen to fix themselves some dinner. There was a lot of loud chattering — and laughter.

Sarge smiled.

(Jury Trial Demanded)

The Plaintiffs, by and through their undersigned counsel, will show unto this Honorable Court the following:

FOR A FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

(Spartanburg Memorial Auditorium)

1. That both Plaintiffs are citizens and residents of North Carolina.

2. That Defendant (hereinafter "the Auditorium") is a corporation organized and existing in the State of South Carolina and is located in the City of Spartanburg, South Carolina and the incident addressed herein did occur in the City of Spartanburg and is subject to the jurisdiction of this Court.

3. That on or about March 24, 2018, Plaintiff Tristan Galloway (hereinafter "Ms. Galloway") was an invitee at the Auditorium. Ms. Galloway paid fees that were given to the Auditorium for her daughter to compete in a dance competition there and for her to be able to attend and watch her daughter compete.

4. That Ms. Galloway was walking down the aisle meant for invitees of the Auditorium to use in order to enter and exit the Auditorium's seating / spectator area when she fell causing substantial bodily injuries to her.

5. That the Auditorium staff turned the lights out where invitees walk and sit during the dance competition. The Auditorium failed to have appropriate lighting along the sides of the aisle or in the floor of the aisle or above the aisle so that people could see where they were walking. The walking area was made completely black by there being no appropriate lighting once the overhead lights in the Auditorium were turned off.

6. That the walking aisle is carpeted and has slopes that must be navigated by those walking in the aisle. It is imperative for there to be lighting in this area to allow invitees to avoid falling over the slopes. The use of slopes combined with no appropriate lighting created an dangerous situation that was hidden from the invitees and created by the Auditorium.

7. That the Auditorium failed to post signs warning invitees of the dangerous conditions; therefore, the failure to warn combined with the walking aisle having no appropriate lighting and slopes created a dangerous condition where invitees were directed to walk while failing to warn of the dangers.

8. That while Ms. Galloway was on the ground, other invitees were trampling her as they could not see her lying on the ground. Accordingly, Plaintiff Eric Galloway has been damaged and believes that he is entitled to judgment against each of the defendants jointly and severally for compensatory and punitive damages in regard to his loss of consortium claim in such amount as determined appropriate by a jury at the trial of this case.

WHEREFORE, the Plaintiffs pray for judgment against the Defendants jointly and severally for damages in amounts to be deemed appropriate by the Court at the trial of this case and for such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

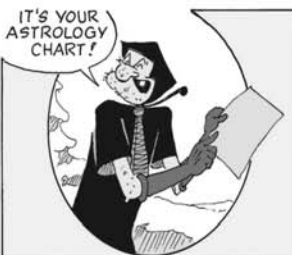
