Emergency allotments (supplements) for existing SNAP households

Since March 2020, the South Carolina Department of Social Services (SCDSS) has implemented the assignment of federally-approved, emergency allotments of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) to all South Carolina SNAP households. The assignment of emergency SNAP allotments (supplements) has brought all authorized households up to the maximum benefit allotment, based on household size, regardless of income.

All program rules, including verification of income, are not waived due to this emergency supplement process.

As DSS receives monthly, federal approval, eligible SNAP recipients will receive their monthly benefit on their normal schedule at the regular allotment amount. The emergency supplement will be issued separately and may show up on a SNAP household's EBT card within 48 hours after their regular allotment amount.

One by one, pediatric rehab patients entered "Santa's Workshop."

The "workshop," located in the Spartanburg Regional Pediatric Rehabilitation clinic, was filled with colorfully wrapped presents in stacks halfway to the ceiling, thanks to Judy and Charlie Bradshaw.

The Bradshaws funded the gifts, which included age-appropriate toys, dolls, puzzles and games that promote improved motor skills, language development or other needs. Physical, occupational and speech therapists selected each gift for their young patients.

"Over the years, we have loved seeing the smiles on the faces of the children when they receive their gift," said Charlie. "It is just wonderful."

Judy added, "The blessing is ours."

The Bradshaws' generosity has benefited thousands of local children in need over the years.

Charlie established the Judy Bradshaw Pediatric Rehab Fund to honor Judy and support her compassion for children. The fund provides support by helping to cover the cost of specialized equipment or other at-home patient needs that may not be covered by insurance.

Lyles said she was grateful for the Christmas celebration - and for all the ways the pediatric rehab program has helped Raylen.

Cribbs Kitchen to expand to Reidville Road in Moore

Originating as peach farmers in the Upstate area, the Cribb family fostered a reputation of festive gatherings and generous hospitality. For several generations, delicious food, good wine, rich discussion, and an ever-rotating guest list are the standard of expectation at the Cribb's dinner table. The restaurant will be 5000 sqft, with over 120 seats, outdoor patio dining space along with a full service bar. The menu will mimic the downtown location along with some specialty smoked meats. Restaurant is slated to open early Q3 2022.

Bell toys

Bell toys, a type of pull toy that had moving parts that rang a bell, were made in America just after the Civil War. The Gong Bell Co. of Connecticut made the first one. It was an iron four-wheel platform, holding a bell and an animal. The animal kicked or hit the bell when the platform moved. A popular bell toy featured an elephant that stepped on the bell to make it ring. The 9-1/2-inch-long toy is made of decorated metal. It was estimated to be worth \$800 to \$1,200.

Later bell toys used wood, tin or other metals and added realistic hair or animal hide. The toys were all painted. The 1880s and 1890s were the golden age for bell toys, and in the 1900s copies were made of metal and eventually plastic. Today, bell toys are wood or plastic made by Fisher Price or Playskool.

Q: I have dishes with bowls that look like heads of lettuce and plates that are a single lettuce leaf. They are marked with the signature "Dodie Thayer." Can you tell me anything about them?

A: Large leaves probably were one of the first "plates" used at a feast. So it's not surprising that plates were shaped like cabbage or lettuce leaves by the 1600s. Leaf-shaped European majolica plates were made by Delft, and by the 18th century they also were crafted by English potteries Wedgwood, Longton Hall, Chelsea and Minton, and French potteries Jacob Petit and Palissy. There was Etruscan Majolica from Pennsylvania, and modern giftware items like California Dodie Thayer ceramics.

This Palm Beach dishware was made during the 1960s and '70s. Dishes were made from molds of actual cabbage or lettuce leaves, or full heads of the vegetable. Pink, red, yellow and green sets were made. They are signed with the artist's name. Recently, the Lettuce Ware dishes were reproduced for the Tory Burch shops in green or white. Full sets are made with cups, plates, tumblers and more. A new salad plate costs \$40. Leaf-shaped dishes of all ages are popular with collectors, but only those made of porcelain or after 1900 should be used to serve food.

Sassafras Mountain road may be closed during winter weather

Pickens County - Recreational users of the Sassafras Mountain Overlook, the Foothills Trail and the Palmetto Trail should be aware that severe winter weather may close the road to the Overlook and the trail parking area for safety reasons.

When severe winter weather is forecasted, Pickens County may close the gate on F. Van Clayton Highway, the road to Sassafras, about a mile

away from the Overlook. Any vehicles left at the parking area near the Overlook would be inaccessible if they are still there when the road is closed.

Because of the steep grade of the road, and its high elevation, the road can be dangerous when covered with ice or snow.

The closings will be posted to the S.C. Department of Natural Resources (SCDNR) website and on



social media. Advanced warning to the closures may be limited due to changing weather conditions.

To check on the status of the road to the Sassafras Mountain Overlook, call

the Pickens County Sheriff's Office at (864) 898-5500.

Sassafras Mountain Overlook is part of the Jocassee Gorges in northern Pickens and Oconee counties along the North Carolina border and surrounding Lake Jocassee. The property features numerous forest ecosystems and many rivers and streams. Jocassee Gorges,

acquired by SCDNR in 1998, is also home to rare and unusual plants and animals. Recreational uses include hiking, backpacking, hunting, fishing, mountain biking, paddling, birdwatching, and nature viewing.

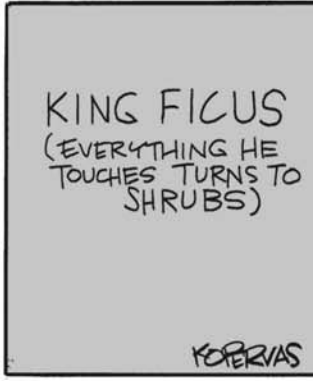

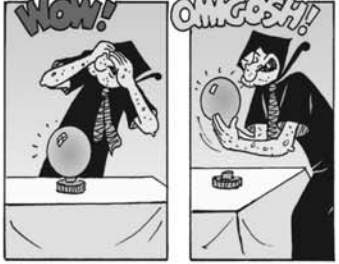
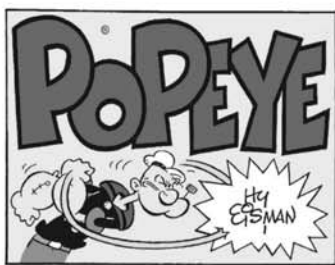

How medical technology is helping those with Parkinson's disease

(StatePoint) When Ann Hanley was 49 years old, she noticed that she had persistent stiffness in her shoulders and her arms weren't swinging normally when she walked. This became particularly pronounced when it affected her ability to travel to horse races with her husband, who manages a farm, breeding champion racehorses. After visiting several specialists, a neurologist recognized she had Parkinson's disease (PD). The diagnosis was a shock, as Hanley had previously viewed PD as a disease that mainly affected older men. Initially the idea of living with a progressive disease was overwhelming for Hanley -- a self-described social butterfly -- and so was maintaining her desire to be active.

PD is the second most common progressive neurodegenerative condition, affecting more than 1 million people nationwide, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. While it can't

be cured, medications are often prescribed to help manage symptoms. Unfortunately, some of these drugs are associated with side effects like involuntary movements and motor fluctuations. And over time, these medications can become less effective.

Now 63, Hanley is a veritable expert on her condition and an advocate for other patients. Seven years ago, she began volunteering at the University of Kentucky Hospital, shadowing a leading neurosurgeon who specialized in a PD treatment called Deep Brain Stimulation (DBS), which helps patients manage the motor symptoms of the disease when medication alone is no longer effective. DBS uses a small medical device implanted in the body and connected to leads that stimulate a portion of the brain to control the motor functions affected by movement disorders, including tremors, slowness and rigidity.

Until recently, physicians have had to rely on

older DBS technology. However, the Boston Scientific Vercise Genus DBS System, approved for use in 2021, is designed to customize therapy to match each patient's specific needs and allow for

flexible stimulation therapy delivery as the disease progresses. This is important, because PD advances over time, and no two people experience progressions the same way. "Ultimately, with early

enough intervention, DBS is a tool that can help people with PD reduce tremors, increase mobility, and even reduce the amount of medication needed -- offering a reprieve from unpleasant side effects," says Dr. Michele Tagliati, MD, director, Movement Disorders Program, Cedars Sinai (Los Angeles). "In particular, this therapy is designed with patient comfort and convenience in mind and gives physicians the ability to manage the ever-evolving needs of a patient as their Parkinson's advances."

Medicare started paying for telehealth medical visits last year and will continue through the end of 2023. With telehealth, we sit in our homes and talk to our doctor on a screen, and Medicare pays for it. In the beginning, the number of telehealth visits skyrocketed -- and then fell dramatically. Is that because we learned the hard way just what the limitations of telehealth really are?

There are people on both sides of the "should seniors use telehealth" debate. They both say they offer solid evidence for their opinion.

Those who claim it's a great thing for us to consult with our doctors via a little screen say it's helpful because it keeps us out of the doctor's office. We don't have to go in among all the germs, and we don't need to worry about transportation.

On the other hand, those who are against telehealth appointments for seniors argue that many of us can't even afford the very devices we would need for telehealth. Even if we have a cell phone, the screen is so small as to be worthless, especially if we have a vision or hearing problem. Then there are the plan fees needed for that device. And what of privacy when we need someone at hand to help navigate the software for us? Do we really want our grandchildren sitting there when we discuss a personal issue with our doctor?

Even if we have a computer, one with a large monitor, how is that going to work when we need the doctor to look at a rash on our back? Or if we really ought to have a stethoscope pressed to our chest because of that ragged cough we've had for days?

Mail Delays Prompt VA to Extend Deadlines

The Department of Veterans Affairs ran into a big snag with a printing vendor and a lot of notification letters to veterans were delayed. But fear not -- the VA is extending your response time.

The Government Printing Office, which provides printing services via contracted vendors, couldn't get out the notification letters dated from July 13, 2021 and Dec. 31, 2021. Some of those letters, which required a response from veterans, could have dealt with required exams for compensation and pension, or for making an election about services or benefits, or more.

Typically, there are problems if you don't respond in time. However, at this point, because of the delayed mailings, the VA isn't going to terminate, reduce or deny services and benefits unless you've been contacted and there's documentation about your right to respond; or the information it asked you for has been received; or the response period has ended.

If you haven't received an expected communication from the VA, call 800-827-1000 to ask about the status of any letters you should have received. Be certain they have current cellphone, home phone, email and address info for you.

If you've filed an appeal, the Board of Veterans' Appeals also is experiencing significant delays in getting information to you about hearings and decisions. As of last month, the board is figuring up a workaround to get information to you and your representatives. If you're waiting on a notice about a hearing, they'll try any number of methods to reach you. If you have to postpone, call them ASAP. If you're waiting on a decision, ask your rep to access CaseFlow to see if your decision information has been included yet.
