### Campobello teacher receives Childers Education Foundation Teaching Excellence Award

Greenville - Ashley McCollum, a fifth-grade math teacher at Holly Springs Motlow Elementary School in Campobello, was named a recipient of the 2016 Childers Education Foundation Teaching Excellence Award from Furman University.

McCollum, an elementary education major, graduated from Furman in May 2016. She received a \$1,500 award during a conferral ceremony and special reception Dec. 7.

A committee of Furman faculty, along with school administrators and mentor teachers who worked closely with award nominees, used three main criteria in selecting the Childers Award winners: love of content, love of teaching, and love of student.

McCollum was recognized for her consistency and creativity in teaching, genuine care and compassion for her students, and her sincere reflection of practice and student achievement.

## Hollywild receives Americorps NCCC award

Wellford/Inman - Hollywild Animal Park has been awarded an Americorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps) team that will work on-site Jan. 11 - March 14, putting in a minimum of 2,500 labor hours on an infrastructure improvement project inside the park.

The team, with 8-10 members, comes from across the country. Their focus is to improve the infrastructure of and area around a pond in the park to reduce erosion, strengthen the resource, and create an educational focal point for indigenous wildlife.

"This is a national award and a very big accomplishment for us," said Hollywild executive director Kim Atchley. Our internal team of staff and volunteers has been working to reclaim areas of the park that had been underused or fallen into disrepair. Having an outside team come in and focus on a big project like this saves us an incredible amount of money and time. With our current resources, it might have been years before we could have afforded to hire the labor to do this project," she added.

Hollywild Animal Park board member Jack Spoon, a retired Milliken executive, first proposed an Americorp NCCC grant application over a year ago. Since then he and Atchley have worked through the extensive application process with program representatives in South Carolina, Missouri, and Kentucky. After the initial application was approved in September, a more in-depth application had to be completed. Once approved at that level, an on-site visit was required. That visit was held December 16th at the park with a six hour visit from a program representative.

During the site visit, Assistant Program Director Stephanie Gittinger explained more of the team nature of the program. Young adults selected for the program work for 11 months, being provided a living allowance during their work time. The complete program specific training and then stay with their team for the remainder of their service term, rotating through four work projects across the country. After completing their term they are awarded \$5,775 toward college expenses.

The team will stay on-site at the park during their work period which begins Jan. 11 and runs through March 14. Inman First

Baptist Church has partnered with the Park to allow the team to use their shower facilities.

Hollywild's education coordinator has already begun reaching out to area educators who might be interested in bringing service learning groups out to work with the team, have a lunch-and-learn meeting with the team, or even combine those with a class in the park's education center which officially opened on September 5th. Though the park is not open to the public during this time, arrangements can be made for educational programs utilizing the center.

"Because this is a group of 18-24 year olds who have chosen service living as a way to earn money for college, we see this as a great opportunity for high school, college, and even some middle school groups to see what they are doing as a model for what they too might want to do in the future," said Schmidt.

Hollywild is reaching out to area businesses requesting hospitality donations for the team. "I'd love for area restaurants, theaters, and entertainment businesses to offer the team a welcome with services from what they have to offer our community," said Atchley.

"We would love for our community to wrap their arms around this team and show them what 'Southern Hospitality' is all about," said Atchley. "We would also appreciate donations of supplies for the work they will be doing."

Atchley says that many of the elements of the project will actually reuse, reclaim, and repurpose existing materials where possible, but among the materials supplies needed are fencing and water impervious lumber or decking to build the educational stations.

Hollywild Animal Park has received a \$20,000 gift from the Balmer Foundation, the Balmer Foundation, a supporting organization of The Spartanburg County Foundation. This is the second largest single gift in the organization's first major fundraising campaign since it became a nonprofit in 1999. Spartanburg manufacturing company Contec led the campaign with a gift of \$150,000 spread over five years. To

date, the Park has raised \$150,000 of the goal of \$250,000 set by Hollywild's fundraising committee.

In March of this year, the community learned of the Park's challenged finances and need for community support.

"We can't do this without significant community support," explained Hollywild's executive director, Kim Atchley, at a community forum held in March at the Spartanburg County Chamber of Commerce. As the year progressed, a fundraising team formed and began reaching out to the community. The team set the minimum target for their goal at \$250,000 for 2016.

To date, the park has raised just over \$150,000, about half of the targeted amount.

Among the accomplishments made this year is the renovation of an old, unused building on property into an Education center, staff joining the Zoological Association of America as part of working toward that organization's accreditation, and upgrading many internal processes including implementing a new data management system that will streamline animal care records and assist with oversight.

Three consecutive "clean" USDA inspections has been a realized goal for the park's new curator, S. Nigel Platt, tasked with the oversight of the animal department.

Community Promotions "adopted" the Park after the spring forum, overhauled the nonprofit's website, boosted its marketing and set up online ticket sales.

"The value of what Community Promotions has done for us is difficult to quantify because the impact has been much more than their investment, but we estimate the value at a minimum of \$20,000."

The final two months of Hollywild's Park Season saw an increase of 1,573 over the previous year. And now, nearing the end of the Park's Holiday Lights Safari Season, visitor traffic has been on the rise from previous years as well.

"We are honored that the Balmer Foundation has recognized what we are working so hard to do for the animals who live here and the community we serve," Atchley said.

In addition to the Contec and Balmer Foundation gifts, individual gifts ranging from \$50 to \$10,000 have come in to support the effort to meet this year's goal of \$250,000.

## Starting the new year by improving relationships

Relationships come in many flavors. They range from very casual to quite close, such as those individuals we consider real friends, often people we have known for a long time. And closest of all, as you might expect, is usually with someone with whom we are romantically and emotionally involved, a spouse or a significant other.

But what many of us fail to appreciate is that all good relationships require work and that's especially true as a relationship ages. While it may often feel that our associations with others simply "happen," these connections require thought and effort if we want them to endure and grow.

One important step in strengthening a relationship is simple being accepting. No two people are exactly alike and what often helps establish a relationship is that each party brings something a little different to the association. However, over time, we may forget that some of those differences were what helped establish the initial relationship. We, instead, may unconsciously be trying to make the other person more like ourselves. It helps to step back, evaluate what makes that relationship special, and refocus on the positive things rather than the differences you may have.

Good relationships also have to be able to survive disagreements. There are going to be times when friends or spouses are going to have differing opinions about a particular subject, with each going in quite an opposite direction. While it might seem nice (if boring), if everyone agreed all the time, for a relationship to thrive it's necessary sometimes to accept the other person's thoughts and to simply agree to disagree.

Another basic element for a good relationship is being able to communicate with the other person. That sounds simple, but in our busy, often stressful world, it can be easy to ignore someone you care about without really meaning to do it.

The key is to take time to focus on how well you are communicating with those you care about. And that doesn't just mean sharing all of your ideas and problems. It means making time for the other person, asking questions and really listening, especially when there are problem areas.

Improving your relationships is a wonderful resolution to make for the New Year. And making it work isn't all that hard. It just requires paying more attention and making time to listen to and enjoy that other person.

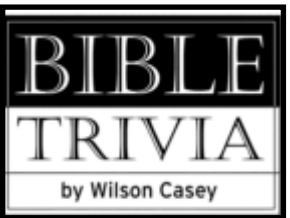

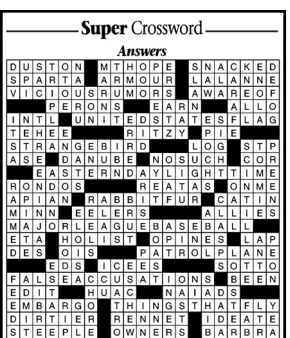

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## Teaming up for a custom fit

Graduating Wofford College student-athletes received an additional gift this holiday: "Dress for Success" advice and a free custom business suit.

David Marvin '16 and Sarah Traynor '17, presidents of the Wofford Student Athlete Advisory Committee, proposed the initiative, which has been met with enthusiastic appreciation by student-athletes who are applying for jobs, interviewing for graduate school or starting careers.

"When David told us about the Dress for Success program after practice one day and that we were getting a free suit, it caught us off guard, in a good way," says Evan Jacks '16, a finance major from Johns Creek, Ga. "I'm interviewing for jobs, so this will definitely help."

According to Marvin, a biology and chemistry major from Charlotte, N.C., this is a first suit for some of the student-athletes.

"One of the guys on the football team came up to me after practice and said he had an interview coming up and wasn't sure how he was going to make it work. Now he'll be able to dress appropriately and make a lasting first impression," says Marvin.

Elizabeth Rabb, the college's associate athletics

director for compliance, says funding for the suits comes from the NCAA Student Assistance Fund.

"Wofford gives us a portion to fund the activities of the SAAC," says Rabb. "Each SAAC board comes up with their priorities for the year, and I help them with budgeting."

The Wofford Athletics Department teamed up

with Men's Wearhouse and its sister company, Twin Hill, to bring the Dress for Success program to Wofford. Between those graduating in December 2016 or May 2017, 93 Wofford seniors will benefit.

Before the end of the semester, seniors who graduated in December traveled to Men's Wear-

house for a fitting. Keith Ferguson, manager of the company's Spartanburg store, also came to campus to meet with all seniors to talk about what it means to dress for success. Joining Ferguson during the presentation were Wofford professional development experts from The Space in the Mungo Center.

"It's fantastic because student-athletes work so hard, both studying and through athletics," says Ferguson, who played college football and understands the time commitment involved in balancing academics and athletics.

The next step, according to Marvin, is a networking event in the spring, so student-athletes will have the opportunity to wear their suits, practice their interview skills and meet people in the business community interested in hiring Wofford student-athletes.

"I hope the SAAC will continue to make this a priority," says Marvin.

## The District of South Carolina U.S. Attorney's Office collects \$65,905,918.40 in civil and criminal actions for U.S. taxpayers in fiscal year 2016

Columbia - Acting U.S. Attorney Beth Drake announced on December 15th that the District of South Carolina collected \$65,905,918.40 in criminal and civil actions in Fiscal Year 2016. Of this amount, \$7,112,893.48 was collected in criminal actions and \$58,793,024.92 as collected in civil actions.

Additionally, the District of South Carolina worked with other U.S. Attorney's Offices and components of the Department of Justice to collect an additional \$78,957,002.59 in cases pursued jointly with these offices. Of this amount, \$200.00 was collected in criminal actions and \$78,956,802.59 was collected in civil actions.

Attorney General Loretta E. Lynch announced on December 14th that the

Justice Department collected nearly \$15.4 billion in civil and criminal actions in the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 2016. The \$15,380,130,434 in collections in FY 2016 represents more than five times the appropriated \$2.93 billion budget for the 94 U.S. Attorneys' offices and the main litigating divisions of the Justice Department combined in that same period.

"Every day, the men and women of the Department of Justice work tirelessly to enforce our laws, ensuring that taxpayer dollars are used properly and that the American people are protected from exploitation and abuse," said Attorney General Lynch. "Today's announcement is a testament to that work, and it makes clear that our

actions deliver a significant return on public investment. I want to thank the prosecutors and trial attorneys who made this year's collections possible, and I want to emphasize that the department remains committed to the well-being of our people and our nation."

"This office has made a substantial commitment to combating fraud," said Acting U.S. Attorney Beth Drake. "The District of South Carolina US Attorney's Office has devoted six lawyers supported by a terrific team of investigators and paralegals to pursue fraud against government agencies. As the Attorney General has noted, year in and year out, our ACE Unit diligently pursues unscrupulous individuals

who seek to line their pockets with tax dollars at the expense of programs destined to support and protect the people of the United States. Whether the targeted funds are designed for Medicare, disaster relief, or a military contract, we give this work the top priority it deserves."

This past March, the District of South Carolina, in cooperation with the Civil Division's Commercial Litigation Branch, the HHS Office of Counsel to the Inspector General and Office of Investigations, and the National Association of Medicaid Fraud Control Units entered a settlement with Respironics Inc., based in Murrysville, Pennsylvania for \$34.8 million to resolve alleged False

Claims Act violations for paying kickbacks in the form of free call center services to durable medical equipment (DME) suppliers that bought its masks for patients with sleep apnea.

The U.S. Attorneys' Offices, along with the department's litigating divisions, are responsible for enforcing and collecting civil and criminal debts owed to the U.S. and criminal debts owed to federal crime victims. The law requires defendants to pay restitution to victims of certain federal crimes who have suffered a physical injury or financial loss. While restitution is paid to the victim, criminal fines and felony assessments are paid to the department's Crime Victims' Fund, which distributes the funds

# Wofford announces 2017 football schedule

Wofford College has announced the 2017 football schedule, which features home games against SoCon foes Furman, Western Carolina, Samford and Chattanooga, along with a road game at South Carolina.

Wofford is looking to build on the success of the 2016 season, in which the Terriers were 10-4 overall and reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA FCS Playoffs. The team had double-digit wins for just

the fifth time in school history. The 2017 season will also be the 30th season at Wofford for head coach Mike Ayers.

The Terriers will open the season at home against Furman on September 2. It will mark the first time Wofford has begun a season against a Southern Conference opponent since 1999 (Georgia Southern). The game will be the first for the Paladins new head coach, Clay Hendrix. Wofford will continue

league play on September 9 at Mercer. The Terriers have won three straight games against the Bears.

Following the open week, Wofford will host Gardner-Webb on September 23 as part of Family Weekend. On September 30, the Terriers make the short trip to Clinton to face Presbyterian College. It will mark the 84th meeting between the two teams and the series is tied at 40-40-3.

Western Carolina visits Gibbs Stadium on October

7 before the Terriers return to Charleston on October 14 against defending Southern Conference champion The Citadel. In 2016, the Bulldogs won 24-21 in overtime in Spartanburg during the regular season, but the Terriers won 17-3 in the second round of the NCAA FCS Playoffs in Charleston.

Homecoming Weekend at Wofford will include a game against Samford on October 21. Last season the Bulldogs won 28-26 in

Birmingham, as the Terriers were unable to tie the game with a two-point conversion attempt with three minutes remaining. Wofford will then travel to East Tennessee State on October 28 for the first time since 2002, with the Bucs playing the first season in a new on-campus stadium.

On November 4, NCAA playoff participant Chattanooga will visit Spartanburg in the final regular season home game. The Terriers face VMI on

November 11, as Wofford has won five straight in the series against the Keydets. On November 18, the Terriers will visit South Carolina. The Gamecocks were 6-6 this season and play South Florida in the Birmingham Bowl on December 29.

All dates are subject to change. Kick off times and the Southern Conference television schedule will be announced at a later date.
