Spartanburg Gallery Calls for Upstate artists to enter COVID-related exhibit

Artists Collective | Spartanburg is calling for Upstate South Carolina visual artists to participate in *The Art of Survival*, an exhibition of 100 pieces of art that were created during the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic.

United Community Bank to participate in Angel Tree gift giving this holiday season

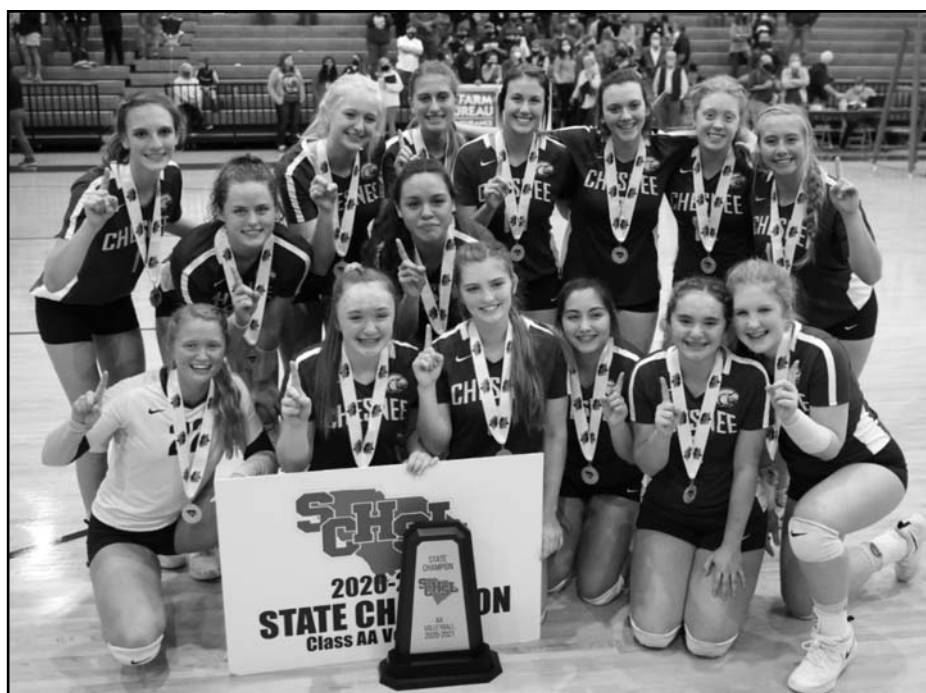

A happy (and healthy) Thanksgiving!

Most people eat more at Thanksgiving dinner than they consume in a normal day, and then continue overeating at year-end. So it helps to have a plan in place to avoid any holiday gobbling that you might pay for later.

Turkey, yams, mashed potatoes, green beans and cranberry sauce are all nutritious, so long as lots of salt, sugar and butter haven't been added to them, says Kathleen Duran-Thal, director of nutrition at Cooper Healthy Living at the Cooper Clinic in Dallas.

An earlier study by researchers at the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development and the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases found that Americans usually gain only one pound during the winter holidays, but the weight put on then isn't shed in the new year.

Keeping weight stable in the fall and winter may help prevent age-related weight gain and associated diseases, says Dr. Riva Rahl, medical director at Cooper Wellness. In addition to not looking or feeling top-notch, adults with excess weight are at greater risk of heart disease, high blood pressure, diabetes and certain cancers, she says.

Cooper Wellness experts say to go ahead and enjoy your favorite Thanksgiving foods, but consider making healthy choices at your turkey dinner. They offer some tips for keeping you from fiddling with your belt at the end of the meal.

1. First of all, don't arrive at a Thanksgiving dinner hungry. Eat a good breakfast, and maybe even lunch that day.

2. Fill half your plate with vegetables, one quarter of it with lean meat, and one quarter with starches like mashed potatoes and turkey dressing.

3. Choose white-meat turkey and avoid eating the skin.

4. Avoid gravy. Turkey doesn't need to be smothered in gravy to taste good. If you want gravy, just drip a little on your meat and potatoes.

5. Limit yourself to small helpings of heavily sweetened yams and cranberry sauces.

6. Use restraint when dinner rolls are passed around. Buttered rolls may melt in your mouth, but they're full of calories, so eat only one.

7. Try sampling in moderation the many foods that you have looked forward to. And consider bringing something healthy to the dinner, like a side dish that's low in fat, sugar and salt.

8. Eat slowly. By eating Thanksgiving dinner slowly, your body has time to register when it is full so that you don't consume too much.

9. At dessert time, try to choose the lightest options.

10. After Thanksgiving dinner, take a walk with your friends or family. Fifteen minutes of walking will get your blood circulating and can burn off 100 calories, says Susie Kania, exercise physiologist and director at Cooper Wellness.

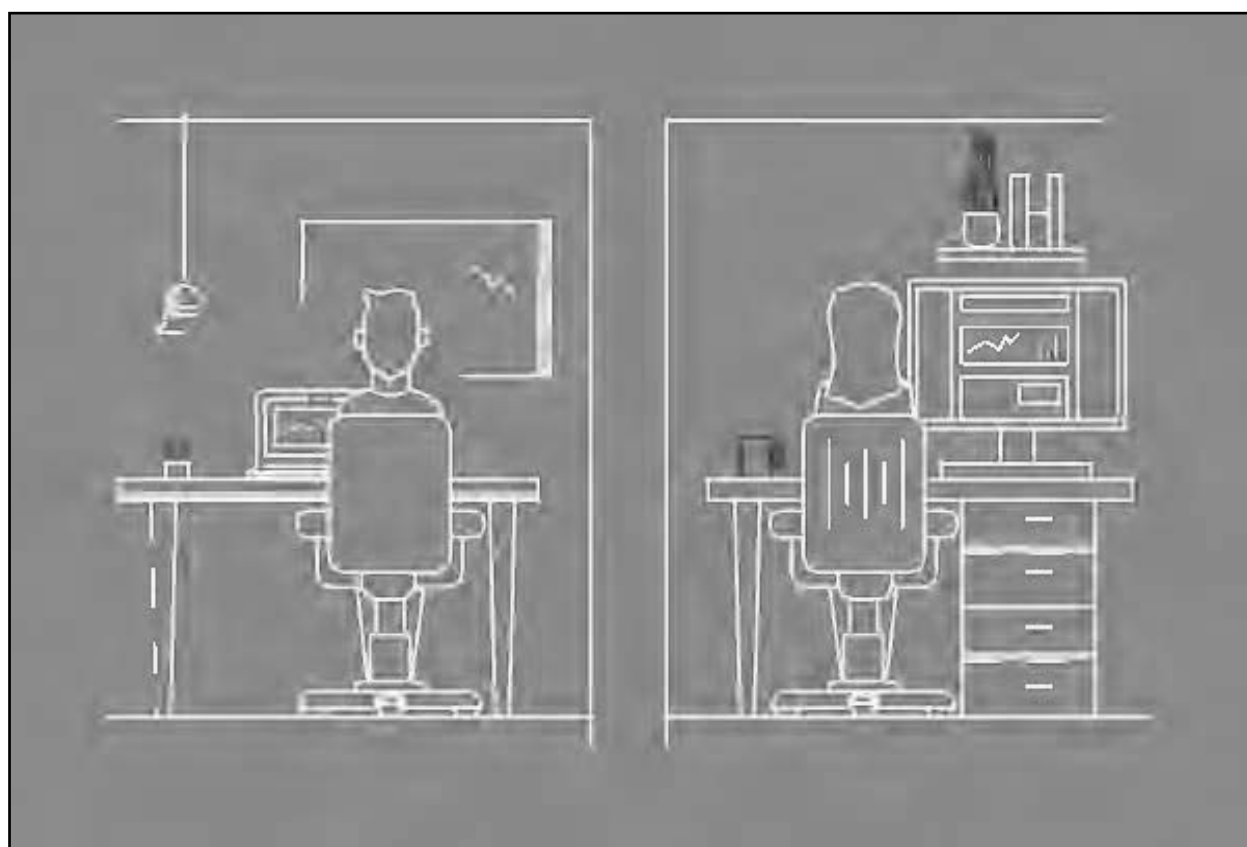
How COVID-19 has changed the way we do business forever

(StatePoint) The COVID-19 pandemic has fundamentally changed how business gets done. And when it comes to mid-sized and small businesses, the importance of investing in new technology, facilitating remote work and maintaining a tech-savvy workforce has never been so clear, according to a new survey.

Conducted by The Harris Poll for CIT Group Inc., a leading national bank focused on empowering businesses and personal savers, the survey of leaders of U.S. middle-market and small businesses is designed to illuminate the intersection of technology and talent.

Compared to last year's survey, significantly more leaders today believe continuous technological investment is a business requirement.

"The resiliency and flexibility that technology can deliver businesses has been convincingly proven by COVID-19," says David Harnisch, president of CIT's Commercial Finance division. "Business leaders have taken that lesson to heart and are focused on making technology a fundamental part of their



'tomorrow thinking'."

Most executives surveyed wish that they'd invested even more in technology over the past 12 months. In fact, more than three in four middle market executives believe investments in technology would have helped their company fare better during the pandemic. For small businesses, roughly half felt similarly.

However, there's little

question how important technology will be going forward, with the majority of respondents saying it's crucial to future success.

Seemingly determined not to repeat the mistake of under-investing, the majority plan to invest as much or more in their business over the next 12 months as compared to the past year. Only 15% of small businesses say they may invest less this coming year, like-

ly due to financial constraints resulting from the pandemic.

"Small businesses don't always have the financial resources that larger enterprises often enjoy," says Ken Martin, managing director of CIT's Small Business Solutions group. "When investments are imperative, borrowing or leasing may be the right solution to acquiring the technology needed to

remain competitive."

When it comes to these upgrades, investments that make it easier for employees to work remotely are a clear priority. Over the next 12 months, 71% of middle market executives and 31% of small business leaders who plan to invest will spend on technology that facilitates remote work.

"It's not just a matter of convenience. Businesses that empower employees to

work remotely have a clear competitive advantage," says Denise Menelly, CIT's executive vice president and head of Technology and Operations.

This is a trend that's likely here to stay. Approximately a quarter of small businesses operating remotely expect -- and want -- these changes to remain permanent after COVID-19 subsides, and about 40% of middle market executives expect the same, with some seeing it as a means to grow the company.

However, this digital transformation puts a premium on a tech-savvy workforce able to support customers and collaborate with colleagues remotely. While many believe their current workforce has the skills to keep up, businesses are also substantially more likely than last year to say companies need to focus on hiring tech-savvy talent.

While the COVID-19 pandemic has created a great deal of uncertainty for small and mid-sized businesses, it has in many ways clarified what's needed to remain successful in an evolving world.

S.C. Secretary of State releases Wise Giving Report and Give Smart Watch List

Columbia - South Carolina Secretary of State Mark Hammond announced recently the release of his office's 2019-2020 Wise Giving Report, in conjunction with International Charity Fraud Awareness Week (ICFAW). ICFAW, which ran from October 19 to 23, is a collaborative education and social media campaign to highlight charitable solicitation fraud and promote wise charitable giving. Participants include charities, regulators, law enforcement, and other nonprofit associations and stakeholders. You can follow the campaign on social media at #CharityFraudOut.

The Secretary of State's Wise Giving Report pro-

vides tips for charitable donors to avoid fraud, and includes data from professional solicitor fundraising contracts and financial reports filed in 2019 and 2020. This year, the Wise Giving Report includes the 2020 Give Smart Watch List - a list of ten charitable organizations that are soliciting or that have registered to solicit in South Carolina. The organizations included in the Give Smart Watch List have either reported spending less than 40 percent of their total expenses on their charitable programs, or have failed to disclose to donors how they are using their money. - "Unfortunately, there are organizations soliciting in our state that exploit donors' generosity by failing to spend a meaningful amount on charitable programs," said Secretary Hammond. "I want our citizens to know that just because a charity claims to

benefit a worthy cause - like helping veterans, first responders, children, or the medically needy - it does not mean that the charity is worthy of your contribution. Donors must take the time to check out these organizations and ask questions about how their donation will be used. If anything seems amiss, donors should notify our office through the confidential Online Charitable Solicitation Complaint Form that is available on our website at sos.sc.gov." Donors can research

charities and professional fundraisers through the Secretary of State's website at sos.sc.gov. The Charity Search and Professional Fundraiser Search features provide registration and financial data, as well as electronic copies of financial reports. Donors can also contact the Secretary of State's Division of Public Charities at 1-888-CHAR-ITI (242-7484) or email charities@sos.sc.gov.

Moments in time

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

- On Nov. 28, 1582, William Shakespeare, 18, and Anne Hathaway, 26, pay a 40-pound bond for their marriage license in Stratford-upon-Avon. Six months later, Anne gives birth to their daughter, Susanna, and two years later, to twins.
- On Nov. 27, 1868, Lt. Col. George Armstrong Custer leads an early-morning attack on a band of Cheyenne in Oklahoma. Custer did not attempt to identify the group of Cheyenne, or to make even a cursory reconnaissance. Had he done so, he would have discovered that they were peaceful people and the village was on reservation soil.
- On Nov. 26, 1922, in Egypt's Valley of the Kings, British archaeologists become the first souls to enter King Tutankhamen's tomb in more than 3,000 years. Inside were several thousand priceless objects, including a gold coffin containing the mummy of the teenage king.
- On Nov. 29, 1942, coffee joins the list of items rationed in the United States during World War II. Butter, sugar and milk had been rationed earlier. By the end of the year, cars were limited to 3 gallons of gas per week.
- On Nov. 23, 1966, Elvis Presley's 22nd film, "Spinout," in which Elvis played a singing race car driver, opens in theaters.
- On Nov. 24, 1971, a hijacker calling himself D.B. Cooper parachutes from a Northwest Orient Airlines 727 into a raging thunderstorm over Washington state. He had \$200,000 in ransom money and was wearing only wraparound sunglasses, a thin suit and a raincoat. No trace of Cooper was ever found, but in 1980 a child found \$5,880 of the ransom money.
- On Nov. 25, 1990, after a howling wind and rainstorm on Thanksgiving Day, Washington state's historic floating Lacey V. Murrow Memorial Bridge slowly breaks apart and sinks to the bottom of Lake Washington. News crews captured the whole thing on camera.

Letters Reach Out to Troubled Vets

We've been in a stressful period for many long months, and now here come the holidays. It's going to be different this year: fewer (or no) family get-togethers, no parties, little shopping at stores ... in other words, a potentially lonely time for many veterans who are sad or anxious or who have PTSD.

The Department of Veterans Affairs has done a randomized evaluation of its Caring Letters Program to test the effects of sending a written letter every month to veterans who have called the Veteran Crisis Line. One result was that when asked, 85% of psychiatric patient veterans agreed or strongly agreed that they would like to receive caring communication through the mail, and the period of time was monthly for one year. (This rated higher than receiving email or text messages.) Granted, given the setting, most of them said that contact with a mental health counselor or physician was preferred, but I expect that a message from a friend or acquaintance or another veteran would likely be just as welcome.

At this point, the Veteran Crisis Line has sent letters to 90,000 veterans over the past year.

What can you do? You can reach out to a veteran you suspect might be struggling, whether it's with suicidal thoughts or just loneliness. Monthly cards or letters in the mail to say hello are small things that can be huge to receive when someone is alone and struggling. Keep the communication brief, but caring.

If you honestly don't know any veterans who might be struggling right now, make a call to the chaplain of your local American Legion or Veterans of Foreign Wars and ask if there's anyone they're worried about.

If you're going to do this, make a commitment to yourself right now that you'll do this monthly for a minimum of one year. The impact of your effort might be greater than you'll ever know.
