

Developer of Auden Living donates masks to first responders & hospitals in Spartanburg

Sherman becomes first chiropractic college to install CBCT imaging

True to its commitment to leading chiropractic education and improving patient care, Sherman College in Spartanburg has become the first chiropractic college to introduce cone beam computed tomography (CBCT) to its radiology department.

CBCT is a radiographic imaging method that allows accurate, threedimensional imaging of hard tissue structures; its use and emergence in medical diagnostic imaging make CBCT an exciting addition to chiropractic radiographic analysis in the upper cervical region of the spine. "Adding new technologies like cone beam computed tomography here at Sherman College further enhances our doctor of chiropractic program, improves patient care, and increases engagement and research opportunities within the profession and the community," said Vice President for Academic Affairs Joe Donofrio, D.C., '94, A.C.P. "We are proud to be the first chiropractic college to incorporate this technology into our curriculum and our patient care. Our radiology and technique faculty played a key role in discovering and promoting this opportunity for the college," Dr. Donofrio shared. "We expect that this unit will reveal details about cervical spine subluxations that we have likely never observed before." Sherman College began the process of bringing CBCT to campus in fall 2019 as part of its "I'm Ready" fundraising campaign, which focuses on securing resources to prepare the next generation of doctors of chiropractic for success. College partners in this effort include the Blair Chiropractic Society and the International Chiropractors Association's (ICA) Council on Upper Cervical Care. Additional support for this and other technology enhancement projects is welcomed through the college's I'm READY campaign.

"The Blair Upper Cervical Society and the ICA Council on Upper Cervical Care are excited about the opportunities we are creating together at Sherman College of Chiropractic," said Tyler Evans, D.C., DCCJP. Dr. Evans serves on the Board of Directors of the ICA Council on Upper Cervical Care, as chair of its special committee on standards of practice, and a member of its committee on advanced

Sherman College faculty and staff are completing training on how to take and analyze images using the Planmeca unit When training is complete, faculty plan to utilize the new technology in patient care and collect evidence of its effectiveness in characterizing vertebral subluxations (misalignments of the spine that cause nerve interference) and advancing the efficacy of chiropractic care. "We hope to work in cooperation with field practitioners and chiropractic organizations such as the Blair Chiropractic Society and the ICA's Council on Upper Cervical Care to advance the use of technology in chiropractic care," Dr. Donofrio shared. "We are ready to take our profession to the next level and to the rest of the world."

Don't let this health crisis overwhelm your kids

While the coronavirus crisis has increased stress levels for all of us, younger children and teens are often more strongly impacted by such a national health disaster.

Kids have not only heard or seen news reports of what is happening but many have also been directly affected by the closing of their schools and colleges.

Such changes produce stress and anxiety for young people. Will there be graduation ceremonies? Will school sports or social events return? I miss my friends. I've never done online classes before. What if I get sick or my parents do?

The reduced socialization that was part of each school day is another stress-producing factor for many children. And yes, even very young children get scared as they hear bits and pieces of the news or see their parents anxiety or the differences in the way the family is living.

There are various changes that parents might observe that show how today's problems are affecting your children. In younger children it might be excessive crying or irritation, the return of behaviors previously outgrown, or exhibiting high levels of worry or sadness. In older children the stress can express itself as changes in eating and sleeping habits, or increased levels of irritability and "acting out" behaviors in teens. School performance may suffer, what were favorite activities may by avoided, and there might be reports of headaches or body pain for no clear reason. As a parent you want to try and help your child, regardless of age, understand what is going on. An age appropriate discussion of COVID-19 is a starting point, one with answers the kids can understand. Try to be reassuring, making your child know that his or her safety is your primary concern. Try to limit your kids' exposure to news or social media stories about what is happening. When needed, share solid information from reliable sources rather than having the kids pick up misleading "facts," rumors and advice from the Internet. The more you can maintain normal, regular family routines, the more comforting it can be for your children. And the better example you can set by staying reliably informed and by setting an example, as much as possible, of a normal, healthy life, the easier it will be for your children to cope with the stress they may be experiencing. Most importantly, don't skip on reassuring hugs and love for your children.

women's basketball player or strikeout from a Spartan baseball or softball pitcher, Ingles made a contribution to three local charitable organizations.

The first Ingles donation program to be set up was 3 for 3's – a 3.00 donation for every three-point basket made last basketball season. The partnership benefitted the Gibbs Cancer Center and Research Institute Survivorship Programs.

The two Spartan basketball teams combined for 344 trifectas, marking a total donation of \$1,032 to the survivorship programs.

The 2020 spring season was just getting cranked up as the college athletics world, and eventually all of society, halted to battle the COVID-19 pandemic. While the onset of the pandemic cost the women's basketball team at least one game to add to the three-point basket total, the pandemic cut the baseball and softball seasons roughly in half. In fact, neither team made it into Big South Conference competition.

The Spartan softball team was 17-7 when the season came to an abrupt end. As of March 13, the Spartans racked up 141 strikeouts. For each strikeout, Ingles will make a \$1 donation to the Hope Remains Ranch, operated by Upstate softball alum Melanie Watt.

Hope Remains offers a place where hurting children and adults can experience hope and healing by participating in various programs using equine therapy. Hope Remains Ranch is committed to offering biblically sound instruction in all of our programs, which includes biblical counseling, The Mane Event –an after-school program for children age 5-17, stable care, Healing Hooves and Marvelous Mini's, a mobile unit taking horses to area schools working with special needs, autistic and children with various behavioral needs.

On the baseball diamond, Upstate was 13-5 when play halted and had amassed 165 strikeouts, and thus a \$165 donation for the Carolina Miracle League. The CML is a charitable organization that provides children with mental and/or physical challenges an opportunity to play baseball as a team member in an organized league.

The COVID-19 pandemic also leaves the record number of participants, 155, in the Miracle League this spring in a holding pattern.

Ingles will present the donations for each program during a ceremony to be held during a USC Upstate home athletic event this fall or early winter. A date for this ceremony has not been set.

USC Upstate and Ingles share a common goal to be champions for the greater good of our community. Throughout the conversations around these donation programs gratitude has been a common sentiment. Gibbs Cancer Center patient Melody Beattie summarized it best, "Gratitude makes sense of our past, brings peace for today, and creates a vision for tomorrow. Excellence in teaching: Professor honored by SCICU for leadership, mentorship

Learning languages beyond English is essential for today's students facing numerous challenges on a global level, according to Dr. Britton W. Newman, associate professor of Spanish at Wofford College.

Newman's commitment to not only teaching a language but to increasing students' understanding of communicating across cultures, has garnered him the Excellence 2020 in Teaching Award, presented by South Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities.

Each year SCICU honors "best of the best" among the faculty at its 20 member colleges and universities, recognizing their effective leadership and mentorship inside and outside the classroom. Honorees receive a professional development cash award.

"Something I acknowledge with my students on the first day of class is that there are massive challenges on a global level that we have to face during their lifetimes," says Newman. "The increasing division, suspicion and hatred among groups in recent years makes it harder and harder to address challenges in areas such as climate change, global health and sustainable economic systems. The first step toward cooperating to address these challenges is literally being able to speak to one another, to understand the ideas someone else can offer, in a way that signals respect rather than arrogance. For that reason, learning languages beyond English is essential."

Mathewson, associate professor of religion. Within literary studies, Newman has published multiple articles on contemporary Cuban narrative with an emphasis on the legacy of cultural hybridity left by the Cuban-Soviet Cold War alliance.

Of his SCICU recognition, Newman says, "It's an honor to receive this award. Faculty at Wofford tend to really pour themselves into the work of designing learning experiences for their students, expanding their own knowledge and skills and mentoring students with feedback and dialogue. I certainly do, and that work is rewarding in itself. To be recognized by my colleagues, to know that people whom I respect so deeply also think I'm doing a great job - that's very affirming and moti-

Spaghetti Pie With Prosciutto and Peas

- ounces thick spaghetti
- large eggs large egg whites
- 1
- container (15 ounces) part-skim ricotta cheese
- cup reduced-fat (2 percent) milk 3/4
- teaspoon ground nutmeg Salt and ground black peppe 1/8
- tablespoon margarine or butte
- bunch green onions cut into 1/4-inch pieces (about 1 cup)
- cup frozen peas slices thinly sliced prosciutto 6 (about 3 ounces)

1. Heat oven to 350 F. Heat large covered saucepot of water to boiling over high heat. Add spaghetti and cook 2 minutes less than label directs 2. Meanwhile, in medium bowl, whisk eggs, egg whites, ricotta, milk, nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 tea-spoon pepper until blended. Set aside. In oven-safe nonstick 12-inch skillet, melt margarine over medium heat. Add green onjong and cock about 5 Add green onions and cook about 5 minutes or until softened. Remov skillet from heat.

3. Drain spaghetti. To green onions in skillet, add spaghetti and frozen peas; toss to combine. Pour egg mixture over pasta and arrange Prosciutte slices on top. 4. Place skillet over medium-high



During COVID-19, take simple steps to establish a new normal

(StatePoint) It's always the right time to commit to healthy habits, behaviors and steps to improve your physical and mental health. With the COVID-19 pandemic creating so much uncertainty and upending so many routines, experts say that focusing on the things within your control is particularly important.

"At this particular moment -- challenging as it may be -- it is very important for all of us as individuals to recognize that our actions can and do have a collective impact," says Dr. Patrice A. Harris, president of the American Medical Association (AMA). "A lot of people are grieving at this moment. Tragically some are grieving loss of loved ones; but people can also grieve the loss of employment, routines or the ability to be with family and friends. Everyone should know that these feelings are normal, and they should allow themselves to experience them."

Here some simple steps from the AMA to maintain your physical and mental health during the unusual times of COVID-19:

1. Channel your feelings of anxiety or helplessness



into action. Practicing physical distancing and making sure to wash your hands with warm soapy water for at least 20 seconds are two steps that protect your health and the health of others. Create a safety action plan for you and your family. Also consider how small gestures like offering to pick up groceries for an older or atrisk neighbor who may be anxious about leaving home -- can make a big difference.

2. Take care of yourself physically. Get as much sleep as you can, try to include fruits and vegetables into your diet, and make sure you move. With many gyms and parks closed and physical distancing in place, it may seem harder to work out, so consider options at home, including dancing, to stay active.

3. Create new routines.

With more people working from home and/or caring for school-aged children, the daily lives we had before COVID-19 are a distant memory. But building routines -- time for work, time for meals, time for decompressing -- is critical to creating a new normal. In the world today, there are so many things we can't control, but our schedules are something we can.

4. Take time to turn off social media and the news. It is critical at this moment to know what is happening in the world and to stay connected with family and friends, but if social media and 24-hour news are making you anxious, consume them in doses.

5. Feel your feelings. It's natural to worry and be afraid at a moment like this. It is also important to

remember there are physicians, public health officials at all levels of government, as well as experts in the private sector, working tirelessly to limit the spread and impact of COVID-19.

6. Stay connected. Social media gives us a common connection point during times of isolation, but there is real opportunity at this moment to stay connected via phone calls and video chats with friends, family, and even people you haven't heard from in a while. Physical distancing is important, but it's still okay to socialize.

7. If you have children, talk to them in an ageappropriate way, and avoid ascribing feelings to them. Don't say, "I know you're scared." Kids are observant and they're wise. They may know things are different, but they may not be afraid. Let them know smart people are working on ways to keep us all safe. Model healthy coping.

Couch theater: DVD previews to enjoy while you're quarantined

"Little Women" (PG) Đ-This treasured classic tale of the March sisters has been brought back again by director Greta Gerwig ("Ladybird"), adapted from Louisa May Alcott's novel and writings. It's a simple coming-of-age tale, from the perspective of Jo (Saoirse Ronan), the family writer, who chronicles her and her sisters' journey to independence. Florence Pugh plays Amy, the youngest, an artist and rival for the attentions of young neighbor Laurie Chalamet). (Timothee Emma Watson, Eliza Scanlan and Meryl Streep round out as Meg, Beth and Aunt March, respectively, all delivering performances that keep this Civil War-set tale as relevant and endearing as ever. "Doolittle" (PG) -Đ Robert Downey Jr. headlines as Dr. Doolittle, the man who can talk to animals. He is joined by an exhaustive list of big-name celebrities who voice an entire menagerie of animals, from Rami Malek as a gorilla to Craig Robinson as a mouse. Even Tom Holland managed to make an appearance as a dog. The story goes that the doctor, cloistered with his animals after the death of his wife, is brought out for a brand new mission to assist a poisoned young queen. During the mission, he must outrun his rival and face new challenges to find a cure. It didn't go over well, and Downey effects a strange accent that is a little off-putting, but I found it to be watchable -- mostly for young kids.



Husband Starting Radiation Treatment

DEAR DR. ROACH: My husband is about to start radiation treatment for stage one cancer on his vocal chord. Does radiation negatively affect the immune system the same way chemotherapy does? Should I be looking out for people who don't vaccinate? — H.T.

ANSWER: Radiation can affect the immune system when it is given to large areas of the body, since the immune system cells are largely sensitive to radiation. Whole-body radiation rarely is used now, except in people planning for bone-marrow transplant. By contrast, localized radiation does not adversely affect the immune system to anywhere near the degree that chemotherapy can, since the bone marrow, where the immune system cells live, is diffuse throughout the large bones of the body.

As far as avoiding unvaccinated individuals, people who are unvaccinated and who are healthy do not pose a risk. It is in an outbreak of vaccine-preventable disease (there have been localized outbreaks of measles and mumps in the past year, and there are seasonal outbreaks of influenza) that unvaccinated people are much more likely to be infectious. So anyone with immune system disease (such as chemotherapy or whole-body radiation) should avoid people with potentially infectious illness. Caregivers of people with severe immune disease certainly should be immunized according to current guidelines. Even elderly people whose caregivers are immunized for flu get flu less than those whose caregivers are not.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I know women who have had double mastectomies in order to reduce the risk of cancer. It seems extreme, but I guess it depends on the evaluation of risk. Are prophylactic hysterectomies done for similar reasons? It used to be routinely done when a woman had passed her reproductive years. I'm interested in your take on this. Will health insurance cover these types of surgeries, and if not, how expensive are they? — S.B.

ANSWER: Prophylactic mastectomies — that is, surgery to remove the breasts in order to avert a breast cancer diagnosis - are a reasonable choice for some women at very high risk of breast cancer, especially those with a family history of breast cancer who have an identifiable genetic predisposition, such as one of the BRCA gene mutations. This decision should be made carefully and in consultation with her doctors, usually an oncologist and a genetic counselor. I have very little experience with this in my own patients, fortunately, but I understand that in the case of women with very high genetic risk, it usually is covered by insurance, if it is the consensus of the treating physicians and the patient that she should proceed.

Hysterectomy — the removal of a uterus - is not done routinely today, the way it was decades ago. They are removed for disease, either benign or malignant. However, the removal of both ovaries and Fallopian tubes, called a bilateral oophorectomy and salpingectomy, is performed in some women at high risk for ovarian cancer. In fact, women with the BRCA mutations may consider both a prophylactic double mastectomy and a prophylactic bilateral oophorectomy and salpingectomy, since BRCA mutations increase risk of breast cancer and ovarian cancer (as well as other cancers).

The cost of surgery in the United States varies dramatically depending on where it is done, but in general it is very expensive.







For the past several weeks, the healthcare system has experienced significant volume drops in elective surgeries, elective procedures, diagnostic testing, ambulatory and emergency center visits, along with paying markedly higher pricing for COVID-19 related supplies. This has led to large financial losses, and these challenges are expected to continue until early June, mirroring the anticipated DHEC COVID-19 impact forecast.

Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System CEO Bruce Holstien said the system has already adjusted by flexing hours, cutting non-labor expenses and reducing the salaries of all management. "The overriding focus is to maintain and support our frontline caregivers while addressing the realities of areas with low to no service demand," Holstien said. "These are non-permanent and temporary measures that are anticipated ending no later than June 6. We will get past this, recover and move forward ever stronger as a community and as a healthcare system."

In addition to cutting

non-labor expenses and management salary reductions, Spartanburg Regional is using a variety of options including redeployment of staff, temporary furloughs and flexed work hours to mitigate the effects of reduced volumes.

"Spartanburg Regional has worked diligently to ensure care delivery and the safety of our team. Leadership has been very concerned about the health

system's economic realities and minimizing impact to our associates and physicians; but these are unprecedented times," said Robert E. Gregory Jr., chairman of the Apella Health Board of Trustees. a 501(c)3 not-for-profit management company that provides oversight to Spartanburg Regional. "All these necessary steps in the fight against COVID-19 have led to sharp declines in the number of procedures and hospital occupancy rates, compelling us to increase our temporary actions."
