Chapman Cultural Center and Hub City Writers Project are pleased to announce the selection of writer Morgan Thomas (they/them) of Gulf Breeze, FL, and visual artist Ben Winans (he/him) of Raleigh, NC, who will begin their nine-month residency in Spartanburg this September and will collaborate on a joint project addressing the culture of the American South.

The Southern Studies Fellowship in Arts and Letters is a three-year initiative jointly hosted by Chapman Cultural Center and Hub City Writers Project and funded through a three-year \$150,000 grant from the Watson-Brown Foundation.

USC Upstate men's golf continues momentous season with historic U.S. Amateur qualification

Adding to their already momentous seasons and building on a historic year for the athletic department, USC Upstate men's golf made its mark on the United States Golf Association's largest and most prestigious amateur event, the U.S. Amateur.

Qualifying for the 121st U.S. Amateur is a feat for a single golfer as you must carry a handicap of 2.4 or less, but also contend with 7,810 other golfers attempting to qualify across 94 qualifying events where only the top two to three golfers earn qualification to crack the 312 player field.

Facing odds of one-hundredth of a percent to make the field, Spartan's Hunter Fry '21 (Dacula, Ga.), Max Dupree (Eatonton, Ga.), and Brady Hinkle (Lancaster, S.C.) each qualified for the 121st U.S. Amateur, giving USC Upstate three representatives in the 312 player field.

In addition to three Spartan golfers who competed in the 121st U.S. Amateur, USC Upstate featured a fourth participant at the event as head men's golf coach Todd Lawton caddied for Fry as the Spartan contingent traversed historic Oakmont Country Club in Plum, Pa.

Oakmont, one of the most prestigious and toughest courses in the world, hosts a historic sixth U.S. Amateur, adding to a major championship list that features a record nine U.S. Opens, three PGA Championships, three NCAA Division I Men's Golf Championships, and two U.S. Women's Opens.

Rare glass tumbler

History repeats itself, and collectors who research their collections are often surprised by the findings. In 1892, a group of businessmen in Greentown, Indiana, invested in a company that was brought in by the newly found fuel – natural gas – that had been discovered there. Two years later, the Indiana Tumbler and Goblet Company had attracted workers and changed the economy of the small town. The company joined the National Glass Company in 1899, and they made many types of colored glass that are popular but scarce today.

The company was making pressed glass in colors when Jacob Rosenthal arrived in 1900. He was an experienced glass maker. The first new product was chocolate glass, an opaque brown and white glass that was a huge success. Next was an opaque medium green color called Nile green, then golden agate, rose agate, holly amber, milk glass and Vaseline glass. Unfortunately, in 1903 there was a fire. The entire factory was destroyed and never rebuilt. But pieces like this Nile green tumbler attract collectors. This 4-inch-high tumbler sold at a Jeffrey Evans auction for \$888.

Q: How do I sell three programs from the 1969 Woodstock festival that are in excellent condition, and what is the range of their value?

A: The program is one of the few official souvenirs of the three-day music festival, which took place in a hayfield 40 miles from Woodstock, New York. No official Woodstock merchandise was sold at the event. The programs didn't arrive until the last day, when there were no vendors to sell them, so they were thrown from the delivery truck, some in the boxes they came in. Not many survived in good condition because of the rain and the mud, or they were discarded and trampled on by the crowd.

The program has been reproduced. The letter "F" in the title "3 days of peace & music" on the cover of the original program is slightly fuzzy because it's in the bud of the sunflower. It's clearer in the reproduction. The first and last pages of the original program are onionskin parchment. The reproduction pages are not as thin. Original Woodstock programs sell at auctions of rock 'n' roll memorabilia. Value of the right single program in good condition is about \$200.

An Unexpected Reunion: Biology professor becomes patient of former student

Early on the morning of June 16, Dr. G.R. Davis, McCalla Professor of Biology, lay on a hospital bed. His chest had been shaved and cold electrodes were in place.

He was being prepared for heart surgery.

"I wasn't nervous," Davis says. "In fact, I had a sense of assurance because the doctor was one in whom I put great trust."

Dr. Michael O'Quinn, who happened to be a 1999 Wofford College graduate and one of Davis' former students, was his cardiologist.

"He was one of mine," Davis says.

O'Quinn performed cryoablation, a procedure meant to restore a normal heart rhythm by disabling heart cells that create an irregular heartbeat.

Twenty-four years ago, O'Quinn studied physiology with Davis. He recalls Davis' ability to use colorful analogies to illustrate scientific principles.

"His classes were inspirational in terms of figuring out how to think about homeostasis and dynamics of physiology," O'Quinn says. "I still remember an

analogy he used of needing to make a series of corrections to maintain equilibrium as being similar to a drunk driver trying to keep his car straight on a road."

Davis is known as an enthusiastic and knowledgeable teacher. He remembered O'Quinn as a go-getter when it came to research. "He participated in a semester research project of his own design under my supervision," Davis says.

O'Quinn knew that he wanted to be a heart surgeon from the age of 13.

"My grandmother passed away from a heart attack. I was in seventh grade," O'Quinn says. "I wanted to understand what happened."

Tall and soft-spoken with

quick blue eyes and a ready smile, O'Quinn is a native of Spartanburg. His father, Thomas O'Quinn, graduated from Wofford in 1973. His sister, Elizabeth, graduated from the college in 2006.

"We all had a positive college experience and an outstanding education," O'Quinn says. "In my medical school class at MUSC (Medical University of South Carolina), there were four or five of us from Wofford, and we were among the best prepared."

The influence of Wofford faculty continues to shape how he approaches his work.

"My base philosophy and the manner in which I have made decisions are based on

the critical thinking skills that I gained in Dr. Charles Kay's philosophy class," says O'Quinn, who also credits Dr. George Shiflet, professor emeritus and former chair of biology, as a mentor and a major influence on his education and career.

Now a distinguished clinical cardiac electrophysiologist, O'Quinn joined Cardiology Consultants in the summer of 2020. He seeks to make wise decisions for his patients and to find a sense of balance in his busy life. He and his wife, Nikole, have three children ages 10, 5 and 1.

"I like to spend my time with my patients," O'Quinn says. "I love research, but it

can be isolating."

Following his Wofford graduation and before medical school, O'Quinn was hired as a research specialist by the Gazes Cardiac Research Institute at MUSC. He then went on to complete his medical degree and doctor of philosophy at MUSC. His doctor of philosophy dissertation focused on gap junctions, which are channels that physically connect adjacent cells and are essential for the spread of electrical activity between cells in the heart. O'Quinn has published 18 research papers and was the lead author of a 2019 paper titled "Approach to Management of Premature Ventricular Contractions."

Practicing as a physician, O'Quinn can apply his knowledge and skills for the benefit of his patients, such as Davis.

Davis jokingly reflected on the unexpected encounter with O'Quinn.

"You never know when your life might be in the hands of a former student," he says. "I'm just glad that I had not given him cause to take vengeance on me!"

Davis and O'Quinn considered the life stages in which they found themselves at their initial meeting at Wofford and, again, this year. Davis was 40 years old and was happily settling into his position at Wofford when O'Quinn took his class. O'Quinn is now in his early 40s and, after years of training, joined a private practice. "You are now in a position to take care of me," Davis says to Quinn.

O'Quinn responded, "It's rewarding — for me, it is really great. I think that a lot of us have that aspiration to come back home and help out our neighbors."

Davis summarizes his reunion with O'Quinn by saying, "You could say that, in a fashion, students who come to Wofford trust us, their professors, with their brains. In return, I trusted one of my students with my heart."

"It can be difficult for families to know where to start and what employment decisions their loved ones should make without overstepping boundaries or interfering with their independence," says Kimberly Tissot, president and chief executive officer of Able

South Carolina. "The resources available through Hire Me SC help build confidence in family members so they can empower, support and be an advocate for their loved ones as they decide what kind of employment is right for them."

Hire Me SC, powered by Able SC and the South Carolina Disability Employment Coalition, is committed to educating family members of individuals with disabilities looking to enter the workforce, fostering connections with other families and encouraging individuals to share stories about their employment journey. As a way to achieve this commitment, Hire Me SC launched this new online resource to serve as a hub of employment information, including external resources, tips for families, empowering success stories and more. The family resources were developed with empowerment at top of mind, and a focus on families being strong advocates for their relative with a disability.

"Family often plays a significant role in the employment decisions made by a person with a disability, but a lack of knowledge and support can lead to family

members compromising the freedom the individual has to make their own employment decisions," says Tissot.

Now in its fifth year, the Hire Me SC campaign drives job seekers with disabilities, service providers, educators, employers and family members to the Hire Me SC website, <https://www.hiremesc.org>, where they can find vital information, job training programs and other resources to help navigate the hiring process.
