Charlotte, N.C. - AAA Carolinas is urging motorists to avoid partaking in the #InMyFeelingsChallenge while operating a motor vehicle.

The challenge, which involves dancing alongside a moving vehicle while Drake's song "In My Feelings" plays was started in June by social media comedian Shiggy. Since then, there have been multiple injury reports from partakers falling out of a moving vehicle or getting hit by passing traf-

AAA Carolinas warns that this trend is dangerous for all parties involved, including those doing the dance in the street as traffic flies by, those recording it on their phone while also attempting to drive and those getting out of a moving vehicle. The distractions created by the In My Feelings Challenge are endless and come with severe consequences. Those caught participating in this global phenomenon could face legal action for those caught participating. For example, in Florida, violators face a \$1000 fine for exiting a moving vehicle.

Learning through play

Children learn through play: colors, shapes, turn taking, developing logic and communicating with others.

Play also helps children through rehabilitation. At Regional Spartanburg Pediatric Rehabilitation Services, play is incorporated into occupational, speech and physical thera-

"Play is important. In the adult world, you can tell a person to do 10 reps in therapy to get them better and back to their job," said Sarah Callahan, pediatric physical therapist. "For kids, their job is play. If we can turn games into a function, kids don't see it as therapy, they see it as fun."

To make therapy even more fun for their patients, Spartanburg Regional Pediatric Rehab created summer theme weeks, which started at the beginning of June and ends before school starts. There is a new theme every two weeks with games and activities to match.

"During Space Week, patients walked with moon shoes to work on balance coordination," Callahan said. "We had a space shuttle repair station where they wore gloves and had to repair the spaceship with screws to work on fine motor skills."

This is the second year Pediatric Rehab held the summer theme weeks for patients. Callahan and occupational therapist Rebecca Carver developed the idea in 2017 to help children reach their therapy goals by incorporating more fun and games into sessions.

"The kids come dressed in costume or in character for each theme," said Sharon Caston, manager

Pediatric Rehab. "The therapists create each activity to target physical, occupational and speech therapy skills." "These theme weeks have become very popular among patients, parents and staff."

This year, camp themes include space, waterworks, outdoor games, tastes around the world, the wild west, and pirates.

"Play encourages exploration, problem-solving, and making relationships between objects, things or concepts," Carver said. "It also develops strength and coordination, encourages social engagement, exposes children to words/ sounds, and supports emotional well-being."

Handling a teenager's need to be more responsible

One of the hardest things for many parents to deal with is their children's demand for more freedoms as they grow into teenagers. After years of making most of your child's decisions and putting your child's needs first, you find yourself confronting a young adult who wants the freedom to face more of the world on his or her own.

On some level, of course, we all recognize that our teenagers need increasing amounts of freedom and responsibility. It's a natural part of the developmental process.

At the same time, we realize there are very real reasons to go slowly in allowing more freedom. News reports and local stories of substance abuse, teen pregnancies, violence and more issues naturally make us worry about the world our teen is facing.

But when we constantly say "no" to our teens' requests, trying to protect and shield them just a little longer, the result is often family conflict, with our teenager pulling away and no longer confiding in us, or perhaps going behind our backs seeking the desired freedom.

While there is no magic cure, there are steps you can take to minimize this conflict. The most important is simply to improve communications.

Sit down with your teen and try to explain your fears and anxieties related to granting increased freedoms. While hearing about your worries may not win your teen's full acceptance or understanding, it can open up meaningful dialogues that can lead to acceptable compromises.

The next step is to go ahead and allow increasing amounts of freedom and responsibilities - opportunities for your teenager to prove he or she really is ready to be more independent.

How much can you trust? How much responsibility should you grant? There are no absolute answers, just judgment calls you have to make based on your teen's personality and past perform-

Yes, mistakes will be made, but also note that most of the time things will turn out just fine. Try to understand that this is also a very difficult and often confusing process for your teen.

Your decisions are still going to worry you and upset your teen at times but when you make a conscious effort to allow increased levels of freedom and responsibility, while also fairly measuring how well your teen handles the changes, you should find that the struggles with your teenager should begin to diminish.








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How to help prepare young people for the workforce

(StatePoint) Student loan debt is on the rise and, unfortunately, the high cost of tuition doesn't mean that graduates are guaranteed to find high-paying, meaningful work after earning a degree.

"Our education and workforce development systems are broken right now, and as a result, the country is facing a crisis," says Mark C. Perna, workforce development consultant, education strategist and author of the new book, "Answering Why: Unleashing Passion, Purpose, and Performance in Younger Generations."

"Millions of jobs in sectors crucially important to our economy and society are open and we have no one with the right skills -- or even the desire -- to fill them," he says.

In "Answering Why" (mark cperna.com/book) Perna lays out a road map for better preparing young people for the opportunities ahead, while also closing the skills gap currently dogging the economy.

Here he offers some of



his top insights and recommendations:

• Biases and misconceptions about younger generations continue to persist and there's an intergenerational struggle to connect effectively. Perna refers to Generations Y and Z collectively as the "Why

Generation," because its members want to understand the "why" behind everything they are asked to do. We need to get to know and understand their traits and abilities if we expect them to perform beyond expectations.

• Non-college career

paths have become stigmatized in this country. Experts like Perna believe that teachers and parents need to move away from the belief that everyone has to go to a four-year university to be a successful and productive citizen. Fulfilling, high-demand,

high-wage careers can be attained by postsecondary training pathways beyond the traditional college route.

• We should prioritize career development exploration and education as part of the K-12 system, Perna stresses. Even many teach-

ers, counselors and school administrators are themselves unaware of the robust opportunities available to today's youth and have tended to devalue career exploration for the sake of sending everyone through one pathway --college.

• The Why Generation needs to better understand the relationship between self-motivation and outside motivation when it comes to achieving goals, and parents and teachers can help. To succeed today, young people must develop the 'want-to' that fosters passion, achievement and positive self-esteem.

"As young people prepare for and enter the world of work, we need to coach them to do three things: focus, plan and take action," says Perna. "This generation is tenacious and talented, but they need to be motivated to reach their peak performance. They can do it, but we have to help."

More Americans protecting their vacation investments with travel insurance

Charlotte, N.C. - As international travel grows in popularity, Americans are choosing to protect their vacation investments by purchasing travel insurance. According to a recent AAA Travel survey, nearly 4 in 10 Americans (38 percent) are likely to purchase travel insurance for future international trips. For those travelers, trip cancellation protection is the most valuable benefit with 9 in 10 (88 percent) of those likely to purchase insurance saying that getting their money back, if they cancel a trip, is their top priority.

Close to home, Carolinians are taking comfort in travel insurance policies as well. To date in 2018, AAA Carolinas Travel department has insured 29,300 members with travel insurance – compared to last year's 25,800 from the same time period.

"There are just too many unknowns, like family emergencies and natural disasters, which can throw an unexpected wrench into a planned vacation," said Sarah Henshall, president of AAA Carolinas Travel. "Travelers are increasingly not taking chances and they're choosing to invest in the value and peace of mind that travel insurance can provide, for international as well as domestic and cruise vacations."

After trip cost (70 percent), the leading influ-

encers for travelers deciding whether to purchase travel insurance are: personal or family health concerns (69 percent); how far in advance the trip is booked (61 percent); and recommendations to purchase insurance by friends or family (57 percent).

In addition to the information collected in the survey, AAA Travel data reflects an increase in demand for travel insurance and members choosing to protect their more expensive vacations. AAA's domestic and international travel insurance sales have increased more than 20 percent yearto-date, with 13 percent more members overall opting to purchase travel insurance last year compared to 2016. In 2017, AAA members insured trips that were approximately 18 percent more expensive than the previous year, according to AAA's 30-year travel insurance partner Allianz Global Assistance.

"The relatively small upfront cost of travel insurance can pay back dividends in the event of sudden and unforeseen circumstances before or during a vacation. As policies and coverage options vary, travelers should consult a knowledgeable travel agent to explore their travel insurance options," continued Henshall.

AAA encourages travelers to keep in mind these advantages of travel insurance to protect their investment in domestic and international trips, as well as cruise vacations. After all, life is unpredictable and some trips need to be cancelled.

* You landed, your bags didn't. Airlines mishandled more than 22 million bags in 2017. Travel insurance can provide coverage to replace needed items if luggage is delayed, damaged or stolen.

* Sick happens. Insurance

may help cover medical expenses while traveling, internationally and in the United States. Many hospitals outside of the country require cash payments before providing treatment.

* Health insurance. Most health insurance policies don't cover international travel. Travel insurance can help cover medical expenses and costly medical evacuation back to the United States in emergencies.

* Flight delays and cancel-

lations. Airlines may not cover all the costs associated with a delayed or cancelled flight. Travel insurance can help reimburse expenses such as rebooking fees, meals and accommodations.

* Economic uncertainties. The loss of a job or other income may mean having to postpone a trip planned in advance. Travel insurance can help travelers recoup their costs when funds are tight.

AAA's travel insurance research findings are the result of a telephone survey (landline and cell phone) consisting of 1,003 adults living in the continental United States. Interviewing for this survey was conducted June 21-24, 2018. This study has an average statistical error of ±4 percent at the 95 percent confidence level for all U.S. adults.

South Carolina earns high marks for fiscal transparency

My office was pleased to receive national attention recently for our efforts to shed light on how your tax dollars are spent.

The state's fiscal transparency website was ranked among the top 10 in the country by a prominent government watchdog organization, the U.S. Public Interest Research Group. The group, which advocates transparency as a tool to hold government accountable, reviewed the transparency sites of all 50 states and issued grades based on how well states make detailed spending information available to the


