New software a game changer for Child Welfare Services case management

In late October the pilot implementation of SafeMeasures® was held, a partnership initiative between SCDSS and the National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD).

SafeMeasures is a web-based reporting program designed to help frontline Child Welfare Services workers use data to manage their caseloads more efficiently and effectively. This tool also amplifies the agency's overarching goal of creating a work culture dedicated to Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI).

NCCD designed SafeMeasures so case managers can focus the most of their time serving the needs of the children and families on their caseloads. This powerful, easy-to-use

Spartanburg Regional Foundation grant addresses problem of unused opioid pills

The U.S. is in the grip of an opioid epidemic.

Opioid overdoses killed nearly 47,000 Americans in 2018, according to the CDC. Many more suffer from addiction or substance use disorder – as many as 2.3 million Americans, the National Institutes of Health estimates.

Those suffering come from all walks of life. They live in large cities, in suburbs and in small towns.

One local physician has ideas for keeping opioids Colbath is helping spearhead the effort and plans to provide these bags for his patients and to distribute them to other doctors who may be interested.

"I'm very grateful to the Foundation for this grant," Dr. Colbath said. "It's really going to help protect our patients and others in the community as we fight the problem of opioid addiction."

Dr. Colbath prescribes painkillers, including opioid pills, to patients undergoing hip or knee replacements. But as he has come to better understand their addictive potential, he urges patients to exercise caution.

As part of pre-operation

might save the pills and use them later without

medical supervision. Experts estimate that there are as many as three billion unused opioid pills sitting in medicine cabinets, toiletry bag and purses, or floating around the streets in the United States.

Adjusting his approach, curbing the crisis

In preparing patients for the post-surgery recovery process, Dr. Colbath has adjusted his methodology. He promotes the use of over-the-counter medicines, such as ibuprofen, and stresses the importance of movement and exercise. And he has reduced the number of narcotic pills he prescribes to patients.

Cactus is a prickly treat

I was shopping in an ethnic grocery store when I saw a huge pile of fresh Prickly Pear cactus pads in the produce section. Prickly Pear cactus is thought to be native to Mexico and is eaten as a vegetable. The cactus is called "nopal" in Spanish, and the pads or stems are called "nopales." Mexico exports 40,000 pounds of nopales pads to Texas every day. They're also grown as an export crop in Central America and Israel.

The pear-shaped fruit on the ends of the nopal pads are called "tunas," and range in color from a greenishwhite to purple. If the tuna fruit are sweet, they're eaten raw or used to make wine or as a sweet syrup. If sour, they're cooked and incorporated into a variety of recipes. I've always wondered about the first adventurous cook to take this prickly crop and turn it into a delightful dish!

Preparing the fresh cactus pads takes time and care, as all of the prickly spines and thorns must be carefully removed. After the pads have been prepped, they're grilled or boiled until tender. When sliced thinly, the nopales are called "nopalitos." They look like Frenchcut green beans and have a

application utilizes data entered into the agency's Child and Adult Protective Services System (CAPSS) to create realtime, interactive dashboards to show case managers what work they need to do and what work has been completed.

Converse awarded 750K grant for Biomedical Research from National Institutes of Health

Converse College has been awarded grants of over \$750,000 to support its faculty-led biomedical research and expand research opportunities for students. Funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) through the National Institute of General Medical Sciences (NIGMS), the grants are a portion of the \$18.9 million that has been awarded to South Carolina institutions upon NIH's renewal of the South Carolina IDeA Networks of Biomedical Research Excellence (SC INBRE) to support biomedical research and infrastructure in the state.

The first grant, secured through the efforts of Dr. Neval Erturk, Professor of Biology at Converse, supports overall biomedical research in the college's Department of Biology, Chemistry and Physics in the amount of \$500,000 over a period of five years. The grant will be applied to faculty and student research across pressing issues in biomedical sciences, such as drug metabolism, obesity, toxicology, biosensor development, and the biology of addiction.

Converse also received a one-time \$40,000 grant to specifically support and enhance the college's experimental facilities and laboratories with new supplies, essential gear and test subject facilities, further strengthening the programs at the institution. Additional facilities and administrative indirect funds of at least \$125,000 will be granted to the college over a five-year period to support operational costs.

Spartanburg Gallery awards \$4,500 to 8 Art Exhibition Winners

The second annual 2020 juried art exhibition presented by Artists Collective | Spartanburg has eight winners from the Carolinas, awarding a total of \$4,500 in cash prizes.

The winners were announced virtually Saturday, Sept. 26.

First place was taken by Gregory Wilkin for his oil painting — Harriet Hancock Center, Melrose Heights, Columbia.

Second place was taken by Seth Scheving of Anderson, for his work *Ignorance Was Bliss*.

In third place is Bennett Stowe for her impressionistic *Dining Room.*

In addition to the first, second, and third place winners, there are five merits award winners: Wendy Converse of Salem, SC; Tomya Henderson of Greenville, SC; Aldo Muzzarelli of Mauldin, SC; Lynne Tanner of Rutherfordton, NC; and Mary Hannah Willingham of Fountain Inn, SC. out of the hands of people who might abuse them. And thanks to a grant from the Spartanburg Regional Foundation, he's got one solution in the bag.

Spartanburg Regional orthopaedic surgeon Gregory Colbath, MD, provides his patients with a specially designed bag for the disposal of any unused painkillers. Dr. Colbath practices at Medical Group of the Carolinas – Orthopaedics

- Skylyn. Created by a company called Deterra, the bags include a charcoal packet that, when mixed with warm water, breaks down and deactivates the medicine.

The patient can then seal the bag and throw it away without risking narcotics flowing into the local water supply or being found and used by others.

In 2020, the Spartanburg Regional Foundation awarded Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System a \$20,000 grant to purchase 5,400 of the deactivation bags. Dr. discussions with patients, Dr. Colbath talks about responsible opioid usage and the proper method for disposing of unused pills.

"At first, I thought it would be a difficult discussion to have with patients, but it has been easy," Dr. Colbath said. "People have become more and more aware of opioid addiction. So many families, including here in our community, have been affected."

The problem of unused pills

In 2018, doctors wrote more than 168 million prescriptions for opioid painkillers. It is considered a good thing when patients don't need to take all of the pills they've been prescribed.

But a problem remains: Unused pills can fall into the hands of the wrong people.

For example, teenagers might find the pills and want to experiment – or sell them to friends who abuse drugs. Or patients If patients don't use all of the prescribed medication, Dr. Colbath urges them to use the Deterra deactivation and disposal bags.

Spartanburg Regional physicians, including Dr. Colbath, have given presentations to local groups and on webinars, hopes to spread awareness.

He understands that it's only one part of curbing the opioid crisis.

"It's a great way to start a conversation with patients and a reminder for them when they have leftover pills," Dr. Colbath said. "And, so far, nearly 100 percent of my patients have said they've used the bags or plan to. I'm really pleased with the response."

Fried Cactus Salad

1 cup fresh nopalitos, rinsed, drained and patted dry

1/3 cup all-purpose flour 2/3 cup cornmeal

1 teaspoon chili powder

1 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon ground black

pepper

1/8 teaspoon cayenne 1 cup vegetable oil

1. To make the fried cactus, place flour, cornmeal, 1 teaspoon salt, black pepper and cayenne pepper in a small bag. Shake the bag to mix the ingredients. Drop the rinsed and drained nopalitos into the bag. Shake until the strips are well-coated.

2. Heat oil in a mediumsized skillet, about 2 to 3 minutes. Fry the strips until they are golden brown. Place strips on a paper towel to drain, sprinkle with the remaining salt, and set aside.



Blue Water Sailors and Agent Orange

Blue Water sailors, heads up. The Department of Veterans Affairs has now made it easier for you to file a claim for Agent Orange exposure. Starting Jan. 1, 2020, The Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 (PL 116-23) extends coverage to those who weren't inland but were shipboard. The difficulty has been gathering all the records and logs required to prove your location. Now the National Archives and

Records Administration has digitized declassified Navy and Coast Guard deck logs (aka ship or captain's logs) from 1956-1978 and put them online to make it easier for veterans to validate their claims. This includes the hospital ship USS Sanctuary.

Some particulars:


