Downtown Programming has returned to Spartanburg's Downtown Cultural District

Downtown Programming has returned for another season. Chapman Cultural Center has brought back the street music series to the Spartanburg Downtown Cultural District. This season began on August 20th. Since its launch in August 2017, Downtown Programming has provided over 800 entertainment experiences through weekly live music and performance "buskers".

Downtown Programming is 100% funded by the Spartanburg Area Chamber of Commerce through the One Spartanburg initiative.

The City of Spartanburg is also a valued supporter of the program.

The goals for downtown programming include increasing, pedestrian traffic, retail sales for local businesses, use of downtown parking garages, awareness of the Spartanburg Downtown Cultural District, and diversity of both performing artists and audience.

Corn adds pop to salads

There's an old saying that the best way to prepare freshly picked corn is to have a pot of water boiling in the corn patch so that you can cook it instantly.

It's best to cook fresh corn as soon after it's been picked as possible. If fresh corn isn't stored or prepared properly, its natural sugars start to diminish quickly, resulting in a loss of sweetness within a couple of days. If you can't purchase fresh corn, frozen corn is an acceptable and delicious substitute for most recipes.

Corn on the cob is an essential part of a summer meal and provides many health benefits year-round. The average serving of corn on the cob has about a quarter of your daily requirement for thiamin, which helps maintain memory, as well as beta-cryptoxanthin, which aids in lung health. Corn is high in folic acid, which is needed for women who are taking oral contraceptives. It also is a good source of fiber and contains fair amounts of vitamin C, magnesium, niacin and potassium. One serving (one ear of corn) has about 83 calories.

A corn kernel is made up of four major parts: starch, fiber, protein and oil. Corn can be processed in different ways to tap into these components, and it's used in all kinds of products. A typical grocery store will contain 4,000 products that list corn ingredients on the label, but many other products also depend on corn -- from paper goods and cardboard packaging to meat, milk, eggs, poultry and other protein products that come from corn-fed animals.

Here's some tips from the Utah State Extension Service for picking and storing fresh corn:

- * Look for corn with good green husk color, silk ends that are free from decay or worm injury and stem ends that are not too discolored or dried. Select ears that are well-covered with plump, not-too-mature kernels. Avoid ears with undeveloped kernels, ears with very large kernels and dark-yellow kernels, because they can be tough and not very sweet.

- * Husk one side of the corn. Press a fingernail into one of the kernels to test the liquid. Ripe corn should have a milky-looking liquid; overripe corn will have either a clear liquid or none at all.

- * The sugar in corn is quickly lost, so for optimum quality process it as soon after picking as possible. If you can't cook fresh corn immediately, store it in the refrigerator.

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

Furman to begin construction on Davis Faxon Training Facility at REK

Greenville - Furman is set to begin construction this fall on the new Davis Faxon Training Facility at REK. This 100% donor-funded facility, which will be utilized by both the Paladin men's and women's golf programs, is named in honor of former Paladin golf greats Cindy Davis and Brad Faxon, who provided lead gifts in the capital campaign.

A three-time All-American selection, Davis was the individual runner-up at the 1983 NCAA Championship where she helped the Paladins to a ninth-place finish, and she went on to finish 12th and lead Furman to a third-place showing at the event as a senior the following season. The 1984 Edna Hartness Furman Female Athlete of the Year, she captured individual medalist honors at the 1983 U.S./Japan Cup and was inducted into the Furman Athletics Hall of Fame in 2011. Davis, the former president of Nike Golf, has served as both vice president of the LPGA and senior vice president of the Golf Channel.

A 1991 inductee into the Furman Athletics Hall of Fame, Faxon won the 1983 Haskins Award, which is given annually to the nation's most outstanding



male collegiate golfer. A two-time All-American, he competed on the 1983 Walker Cup Team and received both the 1983 Golf Magazine and NCAA Coaches' Awards as the country's top amateur golfer. Faxon, who turned professional in 1983, captured eight tournament victories on the PGA Tour. He led the PGA Tour in putting average in 1996, 1999, and 2000, when he set the single-season record with only 1.704 putts per green in regulation.

"We are so grateful for the generosity of Cindy, Brad, and many others who stepped up to ensure

that Furman has one of the best facilities in the country," said Furman women's golf head coach Jeff Hull. "Our outdoor training space is regarded as one of the best in the country. The renovation of the existing REK building, as well as the new Davis Faxon Training Facility, will celebrate our great past while creating an environment for continued development well into the future."

Over \$800,000 in donor commitments have been secured to fund a two-phase expansion and upgrade to the REK Complex. Phase one, the addition of the new state-

of-the-art facility, will begin this fall and has an anticipated completion date of early spring 2021. The Davis Faxon Training Facility at REK will boast six hitting stations in three covered bays, an indoor putting studio, a club repair shop, plus a workout area. Graphics and branding that celebrate the Furman golf legacy will be prominent in the space, which is being designed in collaboration with women's golf alumna Christina Harrell of Jack Porter.

Besides providing an indoor training alternative for the Paladin teams during inclement weather, the

Davis Faxon Training Facility at REK will help Furman continue to attract the nation's top talent and both develop and retain elite golfers. Not only will the facility offer new amenities beyond those in the current facility, it will celebrate the legacy and longstanding tradition of Furman golf by honoring Paladin legends such as Dottie Pepper, Beth Daniel, and Betsy King, along with Faxon and Davis.

Phase two of the project includes a renovation of the REK Center, with construction to begin as commitments are funded. Office suites and locker

rooms for both programs will be renovated, and the building will feature a new Frank Keener Team Meeting Room, generously gifted by Judy Keener of Nashville, Tenn., which will include study space and a kitchen area for student-athletes to utilize. Graphics and branding from Jack Porter will be prominent in the locker room, team meeting room, lobby, and coaches offices. The reconfigured REK will better facilitate coaching, recruiting, and team building.

"This will be a facility that the students will be able to utilize year round to help reach their potential," said Paladin men's head coach Matt Davidson. "Our outdoor practice area at the REK Center is already one of the best in the Southeast, and to be able to have an indoor facility and renovated REK team clubhouse to match will benefit both player development and recruiting. We couldn't be more excited. Thank you so much to Cindy and Brad and so many others who generously made this possible."

Furman plans to hold a dedication ceremony for the new facility in the spring of 2021.

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Tips to ease the financial recovery process after a disaster

(StatePoint) While the COVID-19 crisis continues to be top of mind for many Americans, it's important to remember that other disasters can still occur with little or no warning, making it vital to prepare.

This September, which is National Preparedness Month, get started by checking out Ready.gov and the American Red Cross, two great resources for creating a plan to protect you and your family's immediate safety. As for your financial preparedness, consider these tips from Wells Fargo:

- A natural disaster could potentially destroy paper copies of documents needed for tax and insurance purposes. While you should protect these documents in a fireproof, water-proof box that locks, you should also possess electronic copies. Save birth and marriage certificates, wills, deeds, tax returns, insurance policies and stock and bond certificates on a thumb drive or in a secure location in the cloud.



- Keep an up-to-date inventory of your possessions. One easy way to do so is to use your smartphone to take photographs or videos of everything valuable and store this in the cloud. Your documentation should include cars, vehicles and electronics, as well as any interior and

exterior home improvements you've made which could increase your property value and help with insurance claims.

- Review what your insurance policy covers and determine if additional insurance or coverage is needed. Be sure to take into account how life has

changed in the COVID-19 era. For example, emergency shelters may not be an option for your family given social distancing guidelines, so you may want to consider adding coverage for temporary housing to your policy.

- If you haven't already done so, consider setting

up online banking, mobile banking, automatic bill pay and electronic account alerts. Should you be displaced from your home, these measures will make it easier to stay on top of your accounts and bills. Take this opportunity to ensure your online profiles are up-to-date in case your bank or lender need to con-

tact you post-disaster.

- Note that a disaster can shut down local ATMs and banks for days or even weeks. Include easily accessible cash in your emergency supply kit.

National Preparedness Month: Red Cross research shows older adults more vulnerable in disasters

Columbia - According to new research from the American Red Cross Scientific Advisory Council and the American Academy of Nursing, older adults are more vulnerable and experience more casualties after a natural disaster compared to other age groups. That's why this National Preparedness Month, the Red Cross of South Carolina encourages everyone, especially older adults, to get ready for emergencies.

Being prepared for disasters is important for people of all ages. But there are several factors that make older adults more vulnerable during a natural disaster:

- * Older adults may have more chronic conditions and medication concerns.

- * They may be more dependent on assistive devices like walkers and eyeglasses, and support from caregivers.

- * Living in social isolation can also make them more vulnerable.

"We all care deeply about the older adults in our lives, and during the pandemic they are more vulnerable than ever," said Rod Tolbert, the CEO for the Red Cross of South Carolina. "Now is the time to ask if they need help assessing their needs and making a plan, before an emergency occurs."

PREPARE IN ADVANCE: To be prepared, older adults should think about what they would do during a disaster before it occurs. Understand how your medical, physical and cognitive needs may affect your ability to respond if you had to stay in your home for two

weeks or more or had to evacuate. Building a support network and identifying helpers such as family, friends, neighbors, caregivers and care providers who may be able to assist is vital. Older adults should meet with these supporters and decide how to communicate in an emergency.

DISASTERS DURING A PANDEMIC

Preparing for emergencies is a little different this year, but the three basic action steps remain the same for everyone: Build a Kit, Make a Plan and Be Informed. Assemble two kits of emergency supplies (a stay-at-home kit and an evacuation kit) and a one-month supply of prescription medication. Include personal hygiene items, cleaning and disinfectant supplies and cloth face coverings. Some supplies may be hard to get due to the pandemic, and availability may worsen in a disaster, so start gathering supplies now.

Disasters can force people to leave their homes, even in areas under stay-at-home mandates. By having an emergency plan your family can react quickly if a disaster strikes.

- * Ask friends or relatives outside your area if you would be able to stay with them.

- * Check and see if they have any COVID-19 symptoms or have people

in their home at higher risk for serious illness. If they do, make other arrangements.

- * Check with hotels, motels and campgrounds to see if they are open and if pets are allowed.

- * Due to the pandemic, stay current on advice and restrictions from your state and local public health authorities as it may affect your actions, available resources and shelter facilities.

- * Learn first aid and CPR skills so you'll know what to do until emergency help arrives.

- * Download the free Red

Cross Emergency App for weather alerts and information on what to do before, during and after disasters.






